Executive Orders

Since the beginning of the calendar year, Governor Gavin Newsom has issued 48 Executive Orders. 46 of those orders have been issued in direct response to the COVID-19 pandemic. These orders have covered a broad range of issues, from state administrative matters, to widespread unemployment, to health care needs, to Shelter-In-Place requirements. Notably, this year's Executive Orders have:

- Extended the state tax deadline by 60 days (N-25-20)
- Allowed state and local legislative bodies to act via teleconference (N-25-20, N-29-20, N-35-20)
- Ensured continued funding for schools in the wake of severe disruptions in their ability to gather and meet various time requirements (N-26-20)
- Authorized local governments to halt evictions (N-28-20, N-66-20)
- Authorized \$150M to protect California's homeless population from COVID-19 (N-32-20)
- Outlined how California's local governments may move forward and modify stay-at-home orders (N-60-20)
