- IPM is an ecosystem-based stewardship strategy that focuses on the efficient and long-term prevention of pests.
- Techniques include mechanical (hand-pulling weeds, mowing, brushing trails), cultural (using boot brushes at trailheads, mulching to suppress weeds), and chemical (herbicides, which are used as a last resort when other techniques are found ineffective or not feasible – conducted in accordance with established regulations and guidelines).
- Common species managed in habitat enhancement projects include Bermuda buttercup (oxalis) and Jubata grass.

- Many projects have multiple objectives, such as mitigating fire risk to the park and neighboring communities as well as habitat enhancement.
- Hosted 68 volunteer weeding events, accounting for over 4400 volunteer hours.
- 6 large-scale fuel reduction projects across the County.

DEPARTMENT UPDATE

San Mateo County Parks Commission December 4, 2025

Visitor Experience

Interpretive Events

From September to October 2025, the Interpretive Division hosted or participated in 39 programs, serving approximately 1758 people. We wrapped up the 2025 Take a Hike series, as well as Nature Hikes with Libraries, both of which will resume in Spring 2026. With the start of the school year, classroom and after-school programs have resumed. Fallfest was held in Flood Park with 300 attendees, and over 400 people braved the rain to attend the annual Family Nature Day in Huddart Park. The details of interpretive programs are included in this report as Attachment 1.

Volunteer Events

From September to October 2025, the Volunteer Program hosted 24 volunteer events throughout the parks system. These events totaled 3113 hours of volunteer effort supporting and improving the parks. The details of each event are included in this report as Attachment 2.

Facilities and Infrastructure

Don Horsley County Park at Tunitas Creek Beach

The Tunitas Creek Beach Improvement Project is anticipated to be completed in early 2026. Because of two landslides that are threatening the main access path to the beach, opening of the park is delayed until summer 2026. The Parks Department is working with the Department of Public Works to repair the landslides. The contractor hired to repair the landslides will complete project design documents by mid-January with construction expected to start in March/April 2026. Current schedule has construction occurring for three months. The Department anticipates an opening celebration in June/July 2026.

Realize Flood Park

Following completion of Phase 1 of the Realize Flood Park Project, the reservation system opened for the updated group picnic areas, which accommodate between 40 to 200 people. Construction of the playground continues to progress. All shaping and subsurface work has been completed. Play equipment will start to be installed the week of December 8. This process is anticipated to take approximately six weeks. Once completed, the poured-in-place surfacing will be installed; this will take approximately four weeks to complete. Current project schedule has the playground opening to the public mid-March; however, this is weather permitting. This project remains on schedule and in budget. See photos in Attachment 3.

San Bruno Mountain Day Use Improvement Project

The restroom and interpretive pavilion are nearly complete, and work is underway on the picnic sites. The completed project will provide 4 gender neutral ADA restroom stalls, an open-air interpretive pavilion with educational panels and photo displays, and 9 picnic sites accommodating groups between 8-32 people. A projected opening date is January 2026.



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Quarry Park Mountain Bike Trails

The Department released a solicitation for a contractor to help develop single-track mountain bike trail standards for Quarry County Park. Four firms submitted proposals, and a committee comprised of various Department staff is reviewing and evaluating the proposals. The Department anticipates awarding a contract in December, with a process to develop the standards commencing in January 2026. The Department envisions a 12-month process, inclusive of steering committee meetings and public workshops, to develop the standards.

Natural Resource Management

Pescadero Creek County Park Forest Health and Fuel Reduction Project
Community Tree Service (the project contractor) has completed approximately 40 acres of
understory thinning in Pescadero Creek County Park. Due to weather conditions, the
contractor has demobilized and anticipates returning in January, but this is weather
dependent. When the contractor remobilizes, they will continue to prioritize understory
thinning. No date has been established for when large hazard trees will be removed. The
project comprises a total of 541 acres of treatment area and general treatments include
mechanical mastication and handwork, which will reduce the density of understory
vegetation, ladder fuels, and dead, dying and diseased trees to improve biodiversity and
resiliency against wildfire, drought, pests, and climate change.
