Original EIR

- Used population and traffic projections to measure potential impacts
- 18 potential environmental impacts
- 1 significant and unavoidable impact
- Expressed concerns included:
 - Did not analyze concurrent events
 - Under-analyzed future park use
 - Under-forecasted parking demand



Revised EIR

- More conservative by forecasting concurrent park uses
- Used local park visitor data to forecast peak park use and parking demand
- Recounted and reconfigured parking lot
- 17 potential environmental impacts
- 1 significant and unavoidable impact



Park Visitor Projections

- Comment:
 - Revised EIR does not use appropriate background and assumptions for use projections
- Response:
 - Assumptions are based on reasonable peak capacity of recreational facilities, staff observations, and use of comparable park facilities

Noise

- Comment:
 - Mitigation for athletic noise would be inadequate
- Response:
 - Use of sound amplification equipment requires special permit and air horns are prohibited
 - Compliance will be required through programming agreements
 - 100-foot buffer from Del Norte residences is maintained to mitigate noise impacts



Transportation

- Comment:
 - Analysis of existing parking spaces and parking demand is inadequate
- Response:
 - The Landscape Plan accommodates 369 parking space, which is 11 spaces short of the estimated peak parking demand of 380 parking spaces
 - When scheduling events, the Department will ensure that anticipated attendance at the approved events does not exceed the parking capacity of the park

Transportation

- Comment:
 - Violation of on-street parking restrictions would increase
- Response:
 - Free vehicle access and use of drop-off and pick-up area will mitigate on-street parking violations
 - Park visitors will be informed that on-street parking is not allowed via reservation confirmation, programming agreements, and signage



Preservation of Mature Trees

- Comment:
 - The community has requested that mature trees be preserved
- Response:
 - Over 92% of all trees in the park will be preserved
 - All heritage trees at Flood Park will be preserved
 - Sport fields and other amenities have been sited to minimize impacts to mature trees



Next Steps



Statement of Overriding Consideration

Anticipated increase in traffic noise on Ringwood Avenue during projected Saturday peak use (Noon to 4 p.m.). The Landscape Plan will have a significant and unavoidable impact on traffic noise. However, restricting weekend use of athletic fields at Flood County Park to reduce traffic noise would not fulfill the project objective to meet demand for active recreation facilities in San Mateo County.



Revised EIR Certification

Consistent with the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) *Guidelines*, the County must certify that the Final Revised EIR has been completed in compliance with CEQA and reflects the lead agency's independent judgment prior to considering approval of the project.



Recommendation

Adopt a resolution authorizing:

- 1. The approval of the 2020 Flood County Park Landscape Plan; and
- 2. The certification of the Flood County Park Landscape Plan's Final Revised Environmental Impact Report and Errata; and
- 3. Adoption of California Environmental Quality Act Findings of Facts and a Statement of Overriding Consideration; and
- 4. Adoption of the Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Plan.
