Subject: Resolution to make continuing findings related to continuing remote meetings under Brown Act

RECOMMENDATION:

Adopt a resolution finding that the COVID-19 pandemic state of emergency continues to present imminent risks to the health or safety of attendees and that it continues to directly impact the ability of members of the Parks Commission to meet safely in person.

BACKGROUND:

On June 11, 2021, Governor Newsom issued Executive Order N-08-21, which rescinded his prior Executive Order N-29-20 and which waived, through September 30, 2021, certain provisions of the Brown Act relating to teleconferences/remote meetings by local agency bodies. The Executive Order waived, among other things, the provisions of the Brown Act that otherwise required the physical presence of members of local agency bodies or other personnel in a particular location as a condition of participation or as a quorum for a public meeting.

If the waivers set forth in the Executive Order were to fully sunset on October 1, 2021, and absent any further State action, local agency bodies subject to the Brown Act would be required to fully comply with the Brown Act's meeting requirements as they existed prior to March 2020, including the requirement that the public be afforded physical access to all teleconference locations from which board members were participating.

On September 16, 2021, the Governor signed Assembly Bill (AB) 361, a bill that came into effect immediately and that codifies certain of the teleconference procedures that local agencies have adopted in response to the Governor's Brown Act-related Executive Orders. Specifically, AB 361 allows a local agency to continue to use teleconferencing under the same basic rules as provided in the Executive Orders as long as there is a proclaimed state of emergency, in combination with either (1) local health official recommendations for social distancing or (2) findings adopted by majority vote of the local agency legislative body that meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health or safety of meeting attendees.

AB 361 also requires that, if the state of emergency lasts for more than 30 days, the local agency legislative body must make findings every 30 days to continue using the bill's exemption to the otherwise-applicable Brown Act teleconferencing rules. Specifically, the legislative body must reconsider the circumstances of the state of

emergency and find that the state of emergency continues to directly impact the ability of members of the local agency legislative body to meet safely in person.

As noted above, under AB 361, local agency bodies were required to return to in-person meetings on October 1, 2021, unless they chose to continue with fully teleconferenced meetings and made the prescribed findings related to the existing state of emergency. At its meeting of December 1, 2022, the Parks Commission adopted a resolution wherein the Parks Commission found, among other things, that as a result of the continuing COVID-19 state of emergency, meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health or safety of attendees.

The December 1, 2022 resolution also directed staff to bring an item to the Parks Commission prior to its next meeting to consider making the findings required by AB 361 in order to continue meeting under its provisions.

DISCUSSION:

If the Parks Commission desires to continue meeting remotely pursuant to the provisions of AB 361, the Commission must reconsider the circumstances of the state of emergency. As described at length below, the circumstances remain materially similar to those in existence on December 1, 2022, when the Parks Commission authorized its previous AB 361 resolution.

As noted at that time, the County's high vaccination rate, successfully implemented local health measures (such as indoor masking), and best practices by the public (such as voluntary social distancing) have proven effective, *in combination*, at controlling the local spread of COVID-19.

However, the California Department of Public Health and the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention have cautioned that the Omicron variant of COVID-19, currently the dominant strain in the country, is more transmissible than prior variants of the virus, that it may cause more severe illness, and that even fully vaccinated individuals can spread the virus to others, resulting in rapid and alarming rates of COVID-19 cases and hospitalizations (<https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/variants/delta-variant.html>).

Reducing the circumstances under which people come into close contact remains a vital component of the County's COVID-19 response strategy. While local agency public meetings are an essential government function, the last 30 months have proven that holding such meetings *in person* is often not essential.

The Parks Commission previously found, and it remains the case, that public meetings pose high risks for COVID-19 spread for several reasons. These meetings may bring together people from throughout a geographic region, increasing the opportunity for

COVID-19 transmission. Further, the open nature of public meetings makes it is difficult to enforce compliance with vaccination, physical distancing, masking, cough and sneeze etiquette, or other safety measures. Moreover, some of the safety measures used by private businesses to control these risks may be less effective for public agencies.

These factors combine to continue to directly impact the ability of members of the Parks Commission to meet safely in person and to make in-person public meetings imminently risky to health and safety.

We therefore recommend that the Parks Commission adopt findings to confirm that the Parks Commission has reconsidered the circumstances of the state of emergency caused by the spread of COVID-19; that the state of emergency caused by the spread of COVID-19 continues to directly impact the ability of members of the Parks Commission to meet safely in person; and that conducting in-person meetings at the present time would present an imminent risk to the health and safety of attendees.

A resolution to that effect and directing staff to return prior to the Parks Commission's next meeting to afford the Parks Commission the opportunity to reconsider such findings, is included herewith.

It should be noted that the County's Board of Supervisors has continued to make similar findings, and has specifically encouraged other County bodies to consider making similar findings and continue to meet remotely.

RESOLUTION NO.

RESOLUTION FINDING THAT THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC STATE OF EMERGENCY CONTINUES TO PRESENT IMMINENT RISKS TO THE HEALTH OR SAFETY OF ATTENDEES AND THAT IT CONTINUES TO DIRECTLY IMPACT THE ABILITY OF MEMBERS OF THE PARKS COMMISSION TO MEET SAFELY IN PERSON

WHEREAS, on March 4, 2020, the Governor proclaimed pursuant to his authority under the California Emergency Services Act, California Government Code section 8625, that a state of emergency exists with regard to a novel coronavirus (a disease now known as COVID-19); and

WHEREAS, on March 17, 2020, Governor Newsom issued Executive Order N-29-20 that suspended the teleconferencing rules set forth in the California Open Meeting law, Government Code section 54950 et seq. (the “Brown Act”), provided certain requirements were met and followed; and

WHEREAS, on June 11, 2021, the Governor issued Executive Order N-08-21, which extended certain provisions of Executive Order N-29-20 that waive otherwise-applicable Brown Act requirements related to remote/teleconference meetings by local agency legislative bodies through September 30, 2021; and

WHEREAS, on September 16, 2021, Governor Newsom signed AB 361, which provides that a local agency legislative body may continue to meet remotely without complying with otherwise-applicable requirements in the Brown Act related to remote/teleconference meetings by local agency legislative bodies, provided that a state of emergency has been declared and the legislative body determines that meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health or safety of attendees, and provided

that the legislative body continues to make such findings during the term of the declared state of emergency; and

WHEREAS, California Department of Public Health (“CDPH”) and the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (“CDC”) caution that the Omicron variant of COVID-19, currently the dominant strain of COVID-19 in the country, is more transmissible than prior variants of the virus, may cause more severe illness, and that even fully vaccinated individuals can spread the virus to others resulting in rapid and alarming rates of COVID-19 cases and hospitalizations (<https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/variants/delta-variant.html>); and

WHEREAS, the CDC has established a “Community Transmission” metric with 4 tiers designed to reflect a community’s COVID-19 case rate and percent positivity; and

WHEREAS, the County of San Mateo currently has a Community Transmission metric of “low”; and

WHEREAS, the County of San Mateo’s Board of Supervisors continues to adopt findings pursuant to AB 361 and strongly encourages other County legislative bodies to consider making similar findings to continue meeting remotely through teleconferencing; and

WHEREAS, at its meeting of December 1, 2022, this Parks Commission adopted, by unanimous vote, a resolution wherein this Parks Commission found, *inter alia*, that as a result of the continuing COVID-19 state of emergency, meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health or safety of attendees; and

WHEREAS, this Parks Commission has not met after the 30-day validity of the December 1, 2022 resolution to continue to meet virtually; and

WHEREAS, this Parks Commission has reconsidered the circumstances of the state of emergency and finds that the state of emergency continues to impact the ability of members of the Parks Commission to meet in person because there is a continuing threat of COVID-19 to the community, and because Parks Commission meetings have characteristics that give rise to risks to health and safety of meeting participants (such as the increased mixing associated with bringing together people from across the community, the need to enable those who are immunocompromised or unvaccinated to be able to safely continue to participate fully in public governmental meetings, and the challenges with fully ascertaining and ensuring compliance with vaccination and other safety recommendations at such meetings)

WHEREAS, the Parks Commission has an important governmental interest in protecting the health, safety and welfare of those who participate in its meetings; and

WHEREAS, in the interest of public health and safety, as affected by the state of emergency caused by the spread of COVID-19, the San Mateo County Parks and Recreation Commission finds that this state of emergency continues to directly impact the ability of members of this Parks Commission to meet safely in person and that meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health or safety of attendees, and the Parks Commission will therefore invoke the provisions of AB 361 related to teleconferencing for meetings of the Parks Commission.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY DETERMINED AND ORDERED that

1. The recitals set forth above are true and correct.
2. This Parks Commission has reconsidered the circumstances of the state of emergency caused by the spread of COVID-19.
3. This Parks Commission finds that the state of emergency caused by the spread of COVID-19 continues to directly impact the ability of members of the Parks Commission to meet safely in person.
4. The Parks Commission further finds that meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health or safety of meeting attendees and directs staff to continue to agendize public meetings of the Parks Commission only as online teleconference meetings.
5. Staff is directed to return prior to the next Parks Commission meeting to consider making the findings required by AB 361 in order to continue meeting under its provisions.
6. Staff is directed to take such other necessary or appropriate actions to implement the intent and purposes of this resolution.

Visitor Experience

Visitor Data

The San Mateo County Parks Department will report visitor data to the Parks Commission on a quarterly basis; however, because visitor data is submitted to the office on the first day of the following month (submitted on July 1 for June) and the commission meets on the first Thursday of each month, the data will be reported two months after the end of the quarter. For example, Quarter 4 data will be provided in February Department Report.

Interpretive Events

The Interpretive Program hosted 3 events in December, all of which were classroom programs at San Mateo Park Elementary and Lead Elementary in San Mateo. The details of each event are included in this report as Attachment 1.

Facilities and infrastructure

Tunitas Creek Beach

On December 15th, the Parks Department hosted a ceremonial groundbreaking event for Tunitas Creek Beach to acknowledge the efforts and partnerships that have contributed to making this park development process a reality. There are still several steps to be scheduled over the coming months prior to the start of official construction on the project, and additional updates will be provided in the future.

Quarry Park Master Plan

The Quarry County Park Master Plan was presented to and adopted by the Board of Supervisors at their December 13th meeting. The Quarry County Park Master Plan is a long-term vision and planning document that establishes a conceptual layout and park priorities based on community desires and management obligations. The development of the Quarry Park Master Plan has been a multi-year process driven by community input and engagement, and reflects the feedback and priorities identified by the public through this process.

South Ridge Fire Road & Fuel Reduction CEQA

An Initial Study and Mitigated Negative Declaration for CEQA environmental analysis for projects within Quarry County Park has been prepared and is available for public review until January 26th. The project(s) being analyzed are the construction of the South Ridge Fire Road extension, expansion of fuel reduction efforts within Quarry Park, and the installation of a vault restroom at the pump track. These projects are all identified within the Master Plan as priorities, and this environmental analysis provides additional details on the scope of these projects and the potential environmental effects.

Flood Park

At the December 13th Board of Supervisor's Meeting, a resolution was approved to allow for the finalization of plans and specifications for the Realize Flood Park – Phase 1 project, and to proceed with advertising the project bids for construction.

Natural Resource Management

Climate and Habitat Resiliency Plan

The Climate and Habitat Resiliency Plan was presented to and adopted by the Board of Supervisors at the December 6th Board meeting. The plan will provide the department with an actionable strategy to promote the presence and enhancement of native species, forest habitat, and ecosystems in the park to be more resilient in the face of disturbances such as wildfire and climate change. The Department will return to the Board of Supervisors to present on project details in the future once specific implementation details are further defined and permitting is in progress.

RECOMMENDATION

That the commission review and provide any additions to the list of organizations identified.

BACKGROUND

In its 2022 workplan, the Commission saw fit to create a Partnership and Connections Sub-committee whose mission was to advise the commission on strategies to foment partnerships with local public and private agencies with the goal of advancing the mission of the county around parks and recreation.

The Sub-Committee has reported to the Commission in previous meetings that it was in the process of compiling, in collaboration with department staff, a list of agencies both private and public that the department is currently working with as well as other entities that it may be beneficial to work with.

It has also been noted in past meetings that the commission has in the past convened a get-to-know-each-other-and-share-our-priorities-gathering at which members of city boards and commission were invited.

Staff has also reported that there is a monthly meeting of Parks and Recreation Directors in the county that Director Calderon as well as previous directors have regularly attended over the years. At these meetings directors report on their respective programs and activities and learn from each other regarding any best practices worth sharing.

DISCUSSION

Goal #4 of the commission's workplan seeks to explore and strengthen partnerships with local and regional organizations to increase visibility, as well as to expand equitable utilization and access to County parks.

As a first step, the sub-committee sought to compile a list of organizations that the department was already connecting and partnering with. Secondly, the sub-committee added names of organizations that may not be on list and that the committee thinks should be included. The sub-committee hopes that the

commission can add to this list the wide array of organizations in the county that we could partner with to accomplish our strategic goals.

The sub-committee will subsequently come back with a specific strategy as to how we would implement a 'partnership' plan.

RESOURCES IMPACT: Undetermined at this point, but will become clearer as the partnership plan is developed.
