ALPINE ROAD CORRIDOR IMPROVEMENTS

Total Lack of Specific Information Provided

Draft Resolution: This merely states that Public Works is submitting a request for a grant of \$890,000 for bicycle and pedestrian improvements: *site not specified*, and no details given, even in the Staff Report by Ann Stillman, which does not give the public sufficient information as is the case with many items that appear on these agendas.

Rumor:

I heard that Mary Ann Derwin of Portola Valley coordinated with Ladera residents to request roundabouts at La Cuesta/Alpine and La Mesa/Alpine because parents taking/picking up students from Woodlands School were causing back-ups on Alpine.

(There is a similar situation at Avy/Alameda because of Philipps Brooks and La Entrada schools, and further north along Alameda because of Las Lomitas elementary school. These problems are somewhat mitigated by traffic lights, by the Las Lomitas District school buses, and at times by a deputy sheriff supervising traffic)

Both the above mitigations used in W. Menlo Park and Atherton are options for Portola Valley and Ladera residents.

Background:

Several years ago Stanford Weekend Acres residents appealed for help in making Alpine Road safer between I-280 and Junipero Serra since there had been numerous very serious accidents. The County hired Kimley Horn to do a study. Following that, Ladera residents added requests for improvements at La Cuesta and La Mesa. Kimley Horn prepared proposals that were fraught with inaccurate information, and the last public meeting ended in extremely angry

confrontations based on the poor quality of the study. Included in the proposals were suggestions for roundabouts that were shot down by the participants as dangerous and useless.

The Stanford Weekend Acres residents *got nothing*. Ladera residents *got improved pedestrian crossings*.

Somebody in Ladera or Portola Valley had contacts at Caltrans and, through them, managed to get larger STOP signs and bumps to try and prevent people running the stop signs at I-280.


IF Roundabouts are in fact sought, there would be several issues:

Space: The west side the road is close to the Creek which recently underwent extensive and very expensive environmental armoring because of erosion and subsidence. Recently Stanford paid for trail improvements starting at La Cuesta. On the eastern side is the Ladera Shopping Center and the Ladera Office/Medical Center, and most of the land is, I believe, owned by Stanford.

Emergency Vehicle Access: Alpine is the major evacuation route for Portola Valley and Ladera. It is the primary route for ambulances and fire engines to get to problems in those areas. Also Woodside Fire vehicles frequently respond to accidents between I-280 and Junipero Serra. Roundabouts would impinge on response times, and I would seem unlikely that these agencies would approve roundabouts.

Safety: It has been well documented that roundabouts *may*, in some circumstances, reduce vehicular accidents, several studies show that *they make bicycle travel more dangerous*. See for example: https://cyclingtips.com/2021/03/roundabouts-suck-for-cyclists-heres-why/

What Currently Exists at La Cuesta and La Mesa:

There are stop signs, good line of sight, a straight road, and center turn lanes.

Pedestrian crossings exist to provide access to the wide dedicated trail that was recently improved.

There are ample, well marked, bike lanes on both sides of the road and they are heavily used by pelotons of cylists doing the "Loop" and other recreational and commuting cyclists. There are relatively few large trucks compared to the section of Alpine between I-280 and Junipero Serra.

There are no residences but there are wide turn lanes to enter/exit the Ladera Shopping Center and the Ladera Office/Medical Center.

What Currently Exists on Alpine Between I-280 and Junipero Serra:

Total traffic chaos. There are inadequate bike lanes, and no way for cyclists to cross from the west side to the residences on the east side. There are several blind corners where cars swerve into the bike lane or even onto the pedestrian path.

Traffic comes off the freeway ramp at 60 mph right before turn-ins to Webb Ranch and just before the chaos at the back entrance to Stanford Dish. There have been frequent accidents there.

The bike lanes are inadequate and insufficiently marked over most of the route and at least one death of a cyclist has occurred, plus many other bike accidents.

The bike lanes are sometimes used by motorcyclists.

Stanford traffic is abominable and residents are often unable to enter/exit their own driveways. The pedestrian path through Stanford Weekend Acres, and the trail between Alpine and Sand Hill is now monopolized by cyclists who find the road too treacherous. This now makes it too dangerous for pedestrians.

The vehicular traffic is either bumper to bumper or speeding, and there is no law enforcement. Dump trucks and school buses are routinely overtaken by vehicles crossing the yellow line.

EQUITY ISSUES:

W. Menlo Park residents have, for almost two decades, been appealing to the County for help resolving far more significant issues in the Santa Cruz/Alameda corridor where there have been many very serious accidents and at least one pedestrian death, yet so far little mitigation has materialized.

Stanford Weekend Residents have, for an even longer period, sought help in reducing the dangers along the stretch of road between I-280 and Junipero Serra where there has been at least one death and multiple, frequent, serious accidents. Diana Shu has been helpful in getting radar signs (that are frequently ignored); and some stanchions installed in a couple of places where vehicles were constantly mounting the sidewalk crashing into property or injuring cyclists or pedestrians; the speed limit was slightly reduced (also frequently ignored.) Nothing has been done to curb the totally out of control parking situation at the Dish, or along the west side of Alpine near Ansel Lane or the traffic confusion caused by the activities at the Webb Ranch food stand.

CONCLUSION:

To contemplate spending nearly \$1 million "reinventing the wheel" by commissioning *yet another* duplicative, useless study of "1st world" problems experienced by Portola Valley residents, when the real, **documented** dangers are the other side of I-280 is ridiculous.

If roundabouts are actually being considered as rumored, this is egregious.

Part of the problem with Alpine within Stanford Weekend Acres is the complete lack of

attention given it by the City of Menlo Park which has jurisdiction over the section immediately south of the intersection with Junipero Serra.

The money would be better spent addressing the very real dangers to cyclists and pedestrians the other side of I-280.

The information supplied on the BOS Agendas is not helpful and it would be a good idea for the Agenda to CLEARLY indicate which matters are "Consent" and which are not. The agendas often do not give the public sufficient information to make them aware of issues. This item is one such item. Redwood City and Menlo Park do a far better job of information the public of issues under consideration.

Honorable Supervisors,

Agenda item #58 has two funding components: One for safety improvements on a southern segment of Santa Cruz Ave and another for safety improvements for the southern end of Alameda de las Pulgas. While I am in full support of funding the Santa Cruz/Alameda Safety project and hope you will vote to approve this agenda item, I urgently hope that you will make an added resolution Order that requires County Public Works to stay engaged with the community, address community concerns of poor design and unsafe elements in the planned design, and be prompt and responsive to community questions and communications.

Transportation Authority Cycle 6 references both Community Based Transportation Plans and Vision Zero Bike and Pedestrian Plans. In both cases our community needs to continue to be a significant part of the project planning, design, and implementation process

Public Works has refused to engage with the community over these past 2 years on the Santa Cruz/Alameda project, with the exception of one time this past January where the community requested several low cost immediate actions. not Project related, to immediately address dangerous safety issues along Santa Cruz and Alameda de las Pulgas. That January 10th meeting, while well represented by PW and County management, has resulted in only fractional action, some of which was done in error and had to be removed.

Several in our community have contacted county PW multiple times regarding the Santa Cruz/Alameda project. PW has not respond to those communications. Safety concerns and questions pertaining to the design of the roadway project were never acknowledged or responded to. PW will not reply to emails to address project issues or even design errors and short comings.

PW's lack of response and engagement seems to indicate its refusal to accept feedback and unwillingness to clarify and/or correct design issues. PW's ignoring of the community it is supposed to serve is not acceptable and should not be acceptable to anyone in county, especially you as our Supervisor and representative.

The Resolution for this agenda item needs to be appended with a clause that will bind PW to properly and effectively engage with the community on this project. It should insure that communications from community members have a prompt and quality response. Continuing to allow PW to dismiss community input will end up wasting the funds being allocated by these resolutions and a failure to address significant safety issues in this corridor.

Request Modifications to Resolutions:

At the end of each of the **proposed Resolutions** for <u>Santa Cruz Funding</u> and <u>Alameda Funding</u> please add a 6th statement to order PW to promptly, professionally, and



Esteemed Colleagues:

On behalf of the over 85,000 workers and their families I represent in San Mateo County, I write to strongly urge your support of the proposed minimum wage ordinance for unincorporated County.

The proposed ordinance would create more consistency between the minimum wages within San Mateo County, and would adjust with inflation to avoid wage stagnation in a consistent way that business owners can anticipate and plan for accordingly. Currently, the majority of cities in San Mateo County have a minimum wage higher than that of the State. These cities include over 70% of the County's population. These local minimum wage rates will average just over \$16.50 an hour as of January 1, 2023, which is consistent with the proposed minimum wage for unincorporated San Mateo County of \$16.50 per hour for all businesses with an annual increase of CPI-W or 3.5%, whichever is less.

In the County as a whole, there are approximately 47,000 low wage workers (13% of the County's total workforce). These workers are not kids – only 4% are under 20 years old, over a third have children, and all of them contribute at least half of their family's income. They are disproportionately women, people of color, and the vast majority are currently living under the federal poverty level.

Raising the wage will give workers a chance at a better life for themselves and their families. It will show them that you are as invested in them as they are in serving our County. Having more money in their pockets will help them pay the rising costs of rent (an average of over \$3400 a month for a one-bedroom apartment in San Mateo), and will help them put food on the table, get medical care for themselves and their families, and take care of their kids (childcare in this County averages around \$2500 a month). Further, a higher minimum wage will help these workers be able to exist without needing to draw upon public assistance programs. If you pass this, you'll be giving families a real chance at a better life.

Additionally, economists at UC Berkeley found that a local minimum wage increase has a multiplier effect, increasing the money spent at local businesses and thereby boosting the economy. Evidence from other cities demonstrates that local businesses successfully adjust to the minimum wage increase by raising prices modestly and improve productivity by retaining their experienced employees.

Thank you for your consideration of the proposed minimum wage ordinance.
