Tobacco Retail Permit Background

In 1998, the Tobacco Retailer Permit Ordinance (4.98) was first adopted by the San Mateo County Board of Supervisors to reduce tobacco sales to youth

Subsequent updates were made in 2008 and 2014 to strengthen the ordinance

Separate from the Tobacco Retailer Permit, the Board adopted other tobacco related ordinances which:

- Prohibited the sale and distribution of e-cigarettes (Ord 4.95, 11/12/2019)
- Prohibited the sale of flavored tobacco (Ord 4.99, 6/19/2018)
- Prohibited pharmacy sales of tobacco products (Ord 4.99, 6/19/2018)

Tobacco Retailer Permit Priorities & Opportunities

- Reduce the sales of tobacco to young people and protect public health
- Strengthen the current ordinance provisions
- Support retailer accountability and permit enforcement, with adequate administrative flexibility
- Clarify requirements for County Health to administer city (opt-in) ordinances
- Clean-up county tobacco ordinances to organize all retail-related ordinance requirements under Chapter 4.98, "Tobacco Retailer Permit Ordinance"



Proposed Tobacco Retailer Permit Ordinance Provisions



Strengthens Key Ordinance Provisions & Retailer Restrictions

- Updates definition of tobacco to include synthetic products (4.98.100)
- Updates definition of "Electronic Smoking Device" to include nonnicotine products (4.98.100 (g))
- Expands the definition of "Youth Populated Areas" to be more comprehensive (4.98.100 (u))
- Prohibits new permits within 1,000 feet of youth-populated areas, including private or public K-12 schools, libraries, playgrounds, youth centers, public or private colleges, and licensed child-care facilities (4.98.230 (c))

Strengthens Key Ordinance Provisions & Retailer Restrictions

- Requires in-person sales (no online or mailing), no mobile vending or sales at temporary events like farmers markets or flea markets (4.98.180; 4.98.230(b))
- Prohibits new retailers within 500 feet of existing tobacco retailers (4.98.230 (d))
- Gives the County authority to enforce flavored tobacco and e-cigarette provisions in opt-in cities; eliminates enforcement ambiguity in cities (4.98.310)

Key Ordinance Provisions Administrative Fines

Increases Administrative Fines (4.98.300)

A fine **may** be imposed on the retailer which has violated the requirements and conditions of the ordinance. Fines based on frequency of violations.

	1 st Violation	2 nd Violation	3 rd Violation and all subsequent
Current Ordinance	Up to \$100	Up to \$200	Up to \$500
Proposed Amendment*	Up to \$500	Up to \$1,000	Up to \$1,000
* Sale of Tobacco to People Under Age 21	* Mandatory maximum fine required		

Key Ordinance Provisions: Permit Suspension & Revocation

Grounds for Suspension or Revocation (4.98.290)

If a business is found to violate the terms of the permit, the permit to sell tobacco **may** be suspected and/or revoked

- Violations are tracked over a 5-year period
- Each day tobacco products are offered for sale without a permit is a separate violation (4.98.300 (2)(c))

Violation	Penalty	Timeframe
1 st Violation	Suspension	Up to 30-days
2 nd Violation	Suspension	Up to 90-days
3 rd Violation	Suspension	Up to 1 year
4 th Violation	Revocation	Shall be 5 years
* Tobacco Sales to People Under Age 21	* Maximum penalty is required	

Key Ordinance Provisions: Enforcement

Proactive Annual Site-Compliance Monitoring (4.98.270)

- Each tobacco retailer shall be inspected annually to determine compliance with ordinance provisions
- Increases cost of permit from \$174 to \$423

Enforcement in Cities (4.98.310)

- SMC Health may enforce on behalf of any city if the city council adopts this ordinance in its entirety by reference or verbatim
- Gives SMC Health authority to enforce all provisions of city's tobacco retailer ordinance
- Uniform policies support a high standard for public health, provide clarity for retailers, and are simpler to enforce

Permit Compliance & Enforcement

Health: administer, monitor compliance; peace officer: may enforce provisions. (4.98.2.70)

Environmental Health Services

- Issues permits, collects fees
- Proactive annual on-site compliance checks and complaint-based inspections
- Issues Notice of Violation (NOV)
- Conducts hearings to fine/suspend/revoke permits

Behavioral Health & Recovery Services

- Educates retailers and the public on laws (calls, letters, site visits, etc.)
- Refers complaints to EHS,
 Sheriff's Office, and the cities,
 as appropriate

Sheriff's Office

- Conducts youth decoy
 enforcement operations
 (Tobacco sales to underage
 youth)
- Reports violators to District
 Attorney and EHS






Sheriff's Office Partnership Enforcement via Youth Decoy Operations
