Background

The San Mateo County Youth Commission is an advisory commission to the San Mateo County Board of Supervisors, established in 1993 to address youth need in the county and provide youth voice in local government. The Commission consists of up to 27 members, between the ages of 13-21, who reside in San Mateo County. Funded by the County Manager's Office, reporting to the Board of Supervisors, and housed under the Budget, Policy, and Performance Office, the Commission is a collaborative effort of all three San Mateo County serving entities.



Big Picture Goals, Strategies, and Resources

BACKGROUND ON EMISSIONS REDUCTIONS AND CLIMATE ACTION PLANS (CAP)

City and county governments use a number of different plans that outline how they will achieve long-term goals. In California, clitica and counties are required by State law to have a General Plan, which is a broad, long-range policy document that guides future development, conservation, and land-use. In order to achieve sustainability goals set in a General Plan, or mandated by law, a jurisdiction may adopt additional plans such as a Sustainability Plan, Green Infrastructure Plan, Bicycle and Pedestrian Masser Plan. Climate Adoptation Plan, and/or Citizaté Action Plan.

A climate action plan (CAP) is a detailed and strategic framework for tracking and reducing greenhouse gas (GHQ) emissions to avoid climatic impacts anticipated if no action is taken. In California, these plans are connected to GHQ emissions goals outlined in California state legislation, such as <u>Assembly Bill (AB) 32</u> (2006), and <u>Senate Bill (SB) 32</u> (2016), Municipatities design and sulface climate action plans as acustorized roadnays for making informed decisions and understanding where and how to achieve the largest and most oct-effective emissions reductions that are in alignment with other municipal goals. Typically, CAPs include:

- 1. An inventory of existing GHG emissions
- Reduction goals or targets
- Implementation strategy, including a list of analyzed and prioritized reduction actions (or measures)

Ideally, a climate action plan also identifies required resources and funding mechanisms.

SAN MATEO COUNTY AND CITY CLIMATE ACTION PLANS (CAP)

California and the Bay Area jurisdictions are leaders in climate piedges and plans to reduce GHG emissions. San Mateo County and its municipal jurisdictions in particular are leaders for these efforts due to their aggressive targets (S.F. Chronicie, 2020). The County of San Mateo

Climate Action Plan Description

The County of San Mates (SMC) has two Climate Action Plans (see full history heats): 1 of accumental Coperations Climate Action Plans (COCAP)-2021 and 2) a Community Climate Action Plans (CCAP) (to be adopted stater in 2021 to update the 2013 Energy Efficiency Climate Action Plan). The GOCAP focuses on reducing emissions from municipal buildings and operations, while the CCAP includes a GHG inventory of all emissions hat result from unincorporated areas and a list of measures to reduce those emissions. The County's Office of Sustainability is responsible for the update and implementation of both Plans, ensuring that the County meets its GHG emissions reduction commitments.

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01/2021: SMUHSD collaborated with SMCOE to conduct Baseline Assessment



04/2022: SMUHSD unanimously approved Declaration of Climate Emergency

11/2020: SMUHSD launched District Sustainability Committee



2019: SMC Board of Supervisors approved Declaration of Climate Emergency



05/2022: SUHSD passed Declaration of Climate Emergency



2022-2023: All cities in SMC implemented <u>Climate Action Plans</u>


- Continued a scholarship for outstanding immigrant youth who lack financial resources for college

- Awarded \$1000 dollars to 5 deserving youth


Educational Equity Subcommittee

The committee decided to Pivot to the creation of a new, more feasible Project


- Two members on our committee were working with First 5 SMC and had begun the groundwork.
