






## Survey Respondents: City/Community of Residence




#### Survey Respondents: Age





#### Survey Respondents: Languages Spoken




# What does safety mean to you?

(CARE Meetings)

- Family safety
  - "My five sons will come home safely every night."
- Physical Safety
  - Neighborhoods feel safe
  - Roads are well maintained and well lit
  - Cyclists, pedestrians and horse riders are confident about their safety
- Mental Safety
  - "First step of happiness."
  - State of mind, a feeling
  - Not being afraid
- Community and Collaboration
  - "it's a sense of belonging."
  - "Takes everyone to make a community safe."
  - Being aware of surroundings, laws, and one another
  - Community and law enforcement responsibility

#### Factors Impacting Sense of Safety

2023 Surveys & Focus Groups

#### "Structural"

"We feel safe, we have food to eat, we can see the doctor, we feel good in this city."

- road, park & neighborhood conditions (lighting, signage)
- adequacy of social services
- police presence and reporting of what they do

#### "Community"

"Takes everyone to make a community safe."

- familiarity with neighbors
- nature of interactions with neighbors and in schools
- knowledge of community resources

#### Presence/pervasiveness of crime

"low crime rate"

# Do you understand the distinctions between the Sheriff's Office & other law enforcement agencies?

2023 Survey Responses

59% "Yes" ● 29% "sometimes" ● 10% "no" ● 2% "other" Understanding varies widely - even among those who responded "yes."

Yes

"Sheriff covers unincorporated areas while police departments are typically served by the city police departments." Sometimes

"I think I understand the jurisdictions and distinctions, but there are gray areas." No

"Didn't realize they're different."

"I don't know where one begins and the other ends."



# Perceptions of Law Enforcement/Sheriff's Office

2023 Survey, n=104

	Rating 5-10* (all respondents)
SO is trustworthy	77%**
Feel safer when officers from SO are in my community	84%
SO effectively addresses community concerns	73%**
Comfortable contacting SO for assistance	78%
SO handles complaints & feedback effectively	52%

# Opportunities for Improving Community Engagement

2023 Survey, n=104

	Rating 5-10* (all)
Community should be given more opportunities to be involved in SO initiatives	95%
Increasing community-SO collaboration can enhance trust & safety	97%
I know how to get involved with SO programs/events	47%
I want to be more involved in SO programs/event	85%

#### Focus Group Participants' Suggestions for Strengthening Community-SO Engagement

- "...mostly with young people...that's something I would have liked, for them to teach some classes because there aren't any anymore."
- "Maybe there's not enough information...update their website because it is very confusing to navigate on their website...Especially for us Latinos who are older."
- "It's better those police can speak with us in Cantonese...Live translation is the best. So...we can talk to them."
- "All the coffee at every school was good, we used to go, they made coffee one day a week, they provided coffees and they provided you with education. I am still in the district and there is no school that has coffee with the Sheriff..."



"...it would be nice to have built relationships when there's not a problem. Showing up when there's something bad happening or people fighting or whatever is not the greatest time to be trying to build a relationship with the community, the best time to develop relationships with the community [is] when there isn't a problem. Or you're showing an interest in the development of the community and trying to build trust and build relationships...And what I call it is 'a ride along' a 'community ride along,' not us [riding] along with the cops, but the cops coming into the community and seeing what we go through."

# Considerations & Opportunities

#### Considerations & Opportunities (Slide 1 of 2)

Community perspectives related to sense of safety and perceptions of law enforcement and Sheriff's Office:

- Majority of community members report they generally feel safe.
- Community members' experiences with, perceptions of, and trust in law enforcement are generally positive, with more variability among respondents of color.
- Community members report low levels of familiarity with Sheriff's Office programs.
- Community members report interest in becoming more involved with Sheriff's Office initiatives, programs, and events.

#### Considerations & Opportunities (Slide 2 of 2)

Community perspectives related to factors impacting sense of safety:

- Community members attribute sense of safety to both structural and community factors.
- Community factors are mentioned more often than structural factors, particularly among people of color.
- Factors contributing to community members' sense of safety are not limited to those in the purview of law enforcement/Sheriff.
