- **SUBJECT:** Amendment to the agreement with City of Redwood City

RECOMMENDATION:

Adopt a Resolution waiving the Request for Proposals process and authorizing an amendment to the agreement with the City of Redwood City to provide alcohol and other drug prevention services, extending the term through December 31, 2013, increasing the amount by \$75,000 to an amount not to exceed \$225,000.

BACKGROUND:

On August 28, 2012, your Board approved an agreement with City of Redwood City to provide alcohol and other drug prevention services, for the term July 1, 2012 through June 30, 2013.

DISCUSSION:

Contractor will continue to lead in a collaborative effort, by promoting and improving connections between individuals, peers, families, and other stakeholders. Contractor will also continue to reduce access to and availability of alcohol and other drugs to youth, and build on community assets in order to deliver a full range of prevention based activities.

Behavioral Health and Recovery Services (BHRS) is analyzing how behavioral health services can best be delivered in the County to meet the demands of health care reform, as well as guidelines published by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) in 2011 for behavioral health systems that include the development of Community Service Areas.

In order to address community concerns associated with problem alcohol and drug use and to improve overall health and well-being, BHRS is developing a five year Strategic Prevention Framework (SPF) plan. The SPF will create a sustainable, community-based prevention-focused infrastructure that will build partnerships between local government agencies, schools, faith based organizations, law enforcement, community-based organizations, businesses, and residents to prevent problem alcohol and drug use. BHRS believes that it is in the best interest of the County to continue collaborating with existing providers in the delivery of Alcohol and Other Drug (AOD) prevention services in San Mateo County while finalizing the redesign and the SPF. BHRS recommends a waiver of the Request for Proposal (RFP) process for alcohol and other drug prevention services for an additional six months, and extending of the term of the agreement with City of Redwood City through December 31, 2013, increasing the contract maximum by \$75,000. BHRS released an RFP for Prevention Services in June 2013, with services to begin in January 2014. There are 16 AOD Prevention and/or Treatment contracts being amended and submitted separately for your Board's consideration.

The amendment and Resolution have been reviewed and approved by County Counsel as to form.

The contractor has assured compliance with the County's Contractor Employee Jury Service Ordinance, as well as all other contract provisions that are required by County ordinance and administrative memoranda, including but not limited to insurance, hold harmless, non-discrimination and equal benefits. This agreement is on the Continuing Resolution.

The amendment contributes to the Shared Vision 2025 outcome of a Healthy Community by providing individuals and families in San Mateo County with prevention and treatment services to support recovery, which in turn contributes to the health and safety of communities throughout San Mateo County. It is anticipated that 42 youth and 177 adults will receive prevention services through education, support, youth leadership development, and community mobilization strategies.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The term of the amended agreement is July 1, 2012 through December 31, 2013. The agreement maximum is being increased by \$75,000 to a new maximum of \$225,000. Of that amount, \$150,000 is included in the FY 2012-13 Adopted Budget and \$75,000 will be included in the FY 2013-14 Recommended Budget. It is anticipated that 100% of the increase will be funded by State Net Negotiated allocation. There is no Net County Cost. Through the increase, payment provisions will remain the same and allow the provider to serve the existing number of clients for an additional six months without interruption of services.
