#### **Public Safety**

## At-risk youth receive help with truancy, graduation

An inaugural class of 40 students kicked off Students With Amazing Goals (SWAG) this summer, receiving case management and other support to overcome the truancy, drugs and violence prevalent in the East Palo Alto and Belle Haven community around the program's Green Street location. The enrollees are fifth-year high school students working toward a December graduation by participating in a variety of SWAG activities now and soon starting credit recovery. Around July 21, full-time probation officer Mignon Page-Broughton joins the SWAG team. She is an outstanding asset and really looking forward to working with the students.

As the Board may recall, the County was awarded a competitive, three-year \$885,000 grant to create SWAG with partners One East Palo Alto and Live in Peace.

## Job trainees renovate reentry center

Conversion of the David E. Lewis Community Reentry Center in East Palo Alto into a satellite office of the County's Service Connect program for the formerly incarcerated is

taking another step forward thanks to the hard work and construction know-how of JobTrain staff and students in its pre-apprenticeship carpentry program "Project Build." JobTrain begins work the weekend of July 25 and after a mid-way building inspection will finish the walls the weekend of Aug. 1 with painting to follow.

The County is footing all material costs such as drywall, hardware and paint while Menlo Park-based JobTrain provides all the tools and volunteer labor to create a fully walled office in the southeast corner of the interior. The office gives staff members a private place to discuss sensitive information with clients.

## **Health and Human Services**

## Foster youth graduate from independent living program

The County recently hosted its annual graduation celebration for foster youth in the Independent Living Program (ILP) and awarded each a new laptop computer in recognition of their achievements. ILP provides support and services to youth 14 to 21 in foster care and extended foster care.

To date this year, 68 percent of the 2015 ILP class earned their high school diploma or GED and the Human Services Agency projects that number will hit 78 percent by the end of summer. That figure nears the high school graduation rate of 80 percent for the general population in California. Of those graduates, an estimated 67 percent have enrolled in some form of post-secondary education.

## Utility boxes receive a makeover

Painting of artwork on North Fair Oaks utility boxes began this month with the first at Fifth Avenue and Middlefield Road. Muralist Shayne Oseguera will be busy throughout July to complete all three boxes by Aug. 5. As requested by the NFO Community Council, Shayne will also enlist youth from the Siena Youth Center summer camp to finish the box in front of Garfield Elementary School.

#### Bee-based neighbor conflicts addressed

Hoping to take the sting out of bee-related complaints, the Agriculture Department is working with UC Cooperative Extension and the San Mateo County Beekeepers Guild to develop a voluntary process to help mitigate conflicts between local beekeepers and their neighbors. Training was held for those interested in becoming volunteer impartial beekeeper evaluators and work started on a "process" using mediation and local code enforcement. Once done, the documents will be available on websites like the Agriculture Department, UC Extension and Beekeepers Guild.
