The focus of SNAP-Ed is health promotion to help the SNAP-Ed target audience establish healthy eating habits and a physically active lifestyle and for primary prevention of diseases to help the target audience who have risk factors for nutrition related chronic diseases, such as obesity, prevent and postpone the onset of disease by establishing healthier eating habits and being more physically active. The CDPH authority for these contracts is vested in the Federal-Healthy Hunger-Free Kids Act of 2010 (Public Law 111-296), Section 241, enacted on December 10, 2010, which established the Nutrition Education and Obesity Prevention Grant Program for eligible low-income individuals.

GRANT AMOUNT: The maximum amount payable under this Grant shall not exceed One Million Nine Hundred Six Thousand Eight Hundred Eighteen dollars \$1,906,818.

TERM OF GRANT: The term of the Grant shall begin on October 1, 2016, or upon approval of this grant, and terminates on September 30, 2019. No funds may be requested or invoiced for work performed or costs incurred after September 30, 2019.

Get Healthy San Mateo County lead by the County Health System updated their strategic plan in the summer of 2015. Get Healthy San Mateo will focus on the following four priorities:

By combining our nutrition education activities with physical education we aim to reduce the risk of obesity, Type 2 Diabetes, depression and self-esteem issues, which can impact lifelong health.

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3. Jurisdiction Description

San Mateo County (SMC) residents are ethnically and linguistically diverse with over 80 languages spoken. As outlined in our county profile (SNAP-Ed county profiles 2015) the county SNAP-Ed eligible population is 25.9% White, 48.3% Hispanic/Latino, 16.3% Asian, and 4.7% Black and 4.8% other. Although the county grew by just 1.6% between 2000 and 2010, the Latino population grew by 18% and now makes up a quarter of the county's residents. The Asian population grew even faster and accounts for another quarter of the population. Latinos have the lowest rates of health care coverage in the county as compared to other racial/ethnic groups. A high percentage of foreign-born residents (34% of the population) live in Daly City and East Palo Alto. These include many low-income immigrants from Mexico, Central and South America.

4. Community Assessment

Information used for developing this work plan comes in part from the SNAP-Ed County Profiles prepared by California Department of Health (CDPH) and data from the Department of Finance, U.S Census Bureau, National Low Income Housing Coalition, and California Department of Education. This data was gathered to help identify areas of need and achieve program goals.

According to the Department of Finance, 2014 State and County Population Projections by Race/Ethnicity, the population of San Mateo County is 752,751 as of 2015 and from 2010 to 2060, the population of San Mateo County is expected to increase by 30%. Over the next several decades, the White population is expected to decrease considerably (by 13% between 2010 and 2060), while Hispanic and Pacific Islander populations are expected to increase dramatically (52% and 69% respectively in the same time frame).

More pressing, a total of 18.5% of San Mateo County adults live below the Federal Poverty Level (FPL) of 185%. In addition, California Food Policy Advocates 2015 Food Insecurity Profile for San Mateo County ranked 52 out of 58 counties in the State for participation in the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP). This correlates to only 46% of income-eligible San Mateo County residents actually receiving SNAP benefits. Characteristics of the SNAP-Ed population in San Mateo County are:

- Number of residents participating as of 2015: 31,180
- · Number of income eligible as of 2013: 74,106
- Number of income eligible, non-participants as of 2013: 45,092

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Residents who live below the federal poverty line have to make their limited food dollars stretch further. Unique to San Mateo County is the rental and housing market. According to the U.S Census Bureau's 2009-2013 American Community Survey, the median rent for a two-bedroom apartment is \$2,702, an increase of 46% from 2011. The National Low Income Housing Coalition's 2014 Report indicated that in order to afford a 2-bedroom unit at fair market rate in San Mateo County, a renter would need to earn an hourly wage of \$36.76 (equivalent to annual income of \$78,240 or 4.7 full-time jobs at minimum wage). In the East Palo Alto neighborhood, 79% of households are housing cost burdened, meaning they pay more than 30% of their income on housing, the highest in the county. With housing and rent costs at these levels, many San Mateo County residents are forced to choose between rent and food.

With those statistics in mind, San Mateo Local Health Department (LHD), University of California Cooperative Extension (UCCE), and Catholic Charities of California (CCC) will be coordinating efforts to reach SNAP-Ed residents through multiple strategies and interventions. Our work plan activities will address food access, nutrition education, and provisions of community resources in order to bring action around food insecurity and improved health outcomes.

We understand that nutrition and garden education will be more impactful when the food environment shifts in their communities to make the nutritious choice the easier choice. There is evidence that what people eat-and their likelihood of being obese-is influenced by the food environment in which they live. This is evident by looking at the Retail Food Environment Index (RFEI). RFEI is derived by dividing the total number of fast-food restaurants and convenience stores by the total number of supermarkets and produce vendors (produce stores and farmers markets) in the area. San Mateo County has an RFEI of 4.5, with almost 5 times as many fast-food restaurants and convenience stores nearby as grocery stores and produce vendors. A sample of RFEI ratios include:

- 1. In San Mateo, there are 4 times as many unhealthy food outlets for every healthy food outlet.
- 2. In Daly City, there are 5 times as many unhealthy food outlets for every healthy food outlet.
- 3. In Redwood City, there are 7 times as many unhealthy food outlets for every healthy outlet. Further, the Communities of Excellence in Nutrition, Physical Activity, and Obesity Prevention (CX3) gives us a clear view of the retail stores conditions as well as accessibility to healthy foods. Of the 19 stores surveyed in Redwood City, 13 scored less than the quality standard. Also important to note, only 5 of the 19 stores accept WIC vouchers.

CX3 and retail efforts were identified based on the Retail Food Environment Index (RFEI) and CX3 assessment data from 2013. Our CX3 reassessment will take place in four census tracts throughout Redwood City, East Palo Alto, and Menlo Park. In these neighborhoods fresh produce is often of poorer quality, which diminishes the appeal of these items to buyers. Therefore, local intervention strategies in the work plan are included to focus on increasing the quality of fruits

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and vegetables. Additionally, small market and corner stores are typically oversaturated with advertisements of sugar-sweetened beverages. A priority for the LHD will be to reduce the number of advertisements of unhealthy food items in retail stores participating in the CX3 project.

There is great evidence linking healthcare access and nutrition to the development of non-communicable diseases, and the SNAP-Ed eligible population is at great risk. According to the Healthy San Mateo 2010 report, heart disease continues to be a leading cause of death, accounting for one in every four. High blood pressure prevalence among adults living below the 200% FPL threshold is 32.9%. Prevalence for Blacks is at 38.9% compared to Whites at 31.4%. Furthermore, of the San Mateo County's adult population, 30.4% have been diagnosed with high blood cholesterol. Alarmingly, Type 2 Diabetes is increasing among: children and adolescents, Blacks, Latinos, American Indians, Native Hawaiians and other Pacific Islanders. Clearly, there is a correlation between health status and ethnicity, and those ethnic groups making up the majority of the SNAP-Ed population in this county (2013 Community Assessment: Health and quality of life in San Mateo County). In addition, San Mateo County SNAP-Ed profile indicates that 47% of children and teens ages 2-17 are living with overweight/borderline obesity, and only 29.7% of children (2-11) are physically active at least 1 hour every day.

Healthy Fitness Zone (HFZ) data is an indication of body composition, aerobic condition, strength and flexibility of students participating in statewide Physical Education tests in San Mateo County. In lower income school districts, there is a greater discrepancy in 5th and 7th grade students who meet the body composition and aerobic capacity in comparison to the San Mateo County average.

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As noted on the above table, almost twice as many 5th and 7th grade students in Ravenswood School District and Redwood City School District did not meet the healthy fitness zone for aerobic and body composition in comparison to the San Mateo County average. For this reason, UCCE, and CCC, along with the LHD, will strategize to focus their interventions and nutrition education to incorporate physical activity and healthy eating in these identified school districts. 6. Partnerships and Collaborative Efforts [County Nutrition Action Plan (CNAP) Partners or comparable]

Our San Mateo County CNAP group includes Food and Nutrition Service (FNS), as well as funded and unfunded partners serving the SNAP-Ed eligible population in the areas of food programs, nutrition education and physical activity promotion. The group goal is to coordinate food program interventions to increase food security in the target population. The strategic plan includes initiatives to identify gaps in food security, water consumption, and consistent nutrition and physical activity messaging across programs. The CNAP group meets bi-monthly. Our CNAP Partners include:

- a) San Mateo County Family Health Services/Public Health Nutrition WIC and NEOP Programs. Our NEOP team is the lead partner for the CNAP.
- b) San Mateo County Family Health Services/Chronic Disease and Prevention Unit provides tobacco education, physical activity initiatives for the county and supports general nutrition messaging for county wide dissemination beyond our target populations.
- c) San Mateo County Human Services Agency (CalFresh) is responsible for CalFresh outreach and enrollment. They also have a separately funded dietitian to assist in their outreach efforts to CalFresh-eligible communities.
- d) San Mateo County Aging and Adult Services provide oversight for the Congregate Senior Nutrition Program and Meals On Wheels for San Mateo County.
- e) San Mateo County Health Policy and Planning Unit leads the Get Healthy San Mateo initiative. They support policy development in the areas of healthy eating, sustainable communities and school wellness.
- f) Institute of Human and Social Development is the lead agency for Head Start. They are an important partner for NEOP, UCCE, and WIC in disseminating nutrition/healthy eating messages to eligible families.
- g) First 5 of San Mateo County is the lead agency in the county promoting initiatives targeting young children. It is important that they participate to have a pulse on efforts that impact the population they represent.

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- h) Second Harvest Food Bank of Santa Clara and San Mateo Counties provide healthy foods and nutrition messaging with their programs. They also provide CalFresh enrollment at many WIC sites.
- i) Sequoia Healthcare District provides funding for community initiatives impacting one of our largest target populations in the North Fair Oaks neighborhood of Redwood City. They also fund a couple of Wellness Coordinators for two of our target school districts Redwood City School and Sequoia School Districts.
- j) San Mateo County Department of Agriculture, Weights and Measures has oversight of the county Farm Bureau and promotes the Fresh As It Gets initiative to encourage businesses and institutions to source foods from local farmers and ranchers.
- k) UC Cooperative Extension is our NEOP Work Plan partner. Our LHD meets regularly with UCCE to compare work, make sure we do not overlap, and provide support to each other in our NEOP/UC CalFresh/Catholic Charities efforts.
- l) Dairy Council of California has great educational resources and brings a wealth of information on what other jurisdictions are working on in the area of healthy eating and nutrition.
- m) Catholic Charities is our NEOP Work Plan partner. Our LHD will meet regularly with Catholic Charities to compare work, make sure we do not overlap, and provide support to each other in our NEOP/UC CalFresh/Catholic Charities efforts.

9. Intervention and Evaluation Plan Narrative Summary [Not to exceed 8 pages]

All three local implementing agencies in San Mateo County, the Local Health Department (LHD), UCCE CalFresh (UCCE) and Catholic Charities of California (CCC) will collaborate to produce needs based interventions across the five categories consisting of:

- Goal 1: Food and Beverages (Behavioral)
- Goal 2: Physical Activity (Behavioral)
- Goal 3: Food Resource Management (Behavioral)
- Goal 4: Access to and/or appeal of dietary choices (Physical and Social Environmental)
- Goal 5: Access to and/or appeal of physical activity opportunities (Physical and Social Environmental)

Using measurable strategies to support those efforts, each State Implementing Agency will identify target sites from the Site Spreadsheet to determine interest, needs, scope, implementation and impact that align with identified strategies which encompass the framework of the Social Ecological Model. The frame work

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consist of individual factors, environmental settings, sectors of influence, social/cultural norms and values. The following strategies were selected by LHD, UCCE, and CCC to aide in environmental supports: **1.** Direct and indirect education (All LIA) **2.** Structured physical activity (ALL LIA) **3.** Safe Routes to School (LHD) **4.** Smarter Lunchrooms Movement (SLM)(UCCE) **5.** Edible gardens (All LIA) **6.** Farm to School (LHD) **7.** Wellness policies (LHD/UCCE) **8.** Participation in fairs and events (LHD) **9.** Staff trainings (LHD/UCCE) **10.** Media and the assessment and implementation of CX3 (LHD). While each LIA will conduct direct and indirect education, we have agreed to work synergistically to avoid duplication of services at the same site. Each LIA will implement their area of expertise at a given site and will allow for a different strategy if there is a need from a different LIA.

While we do have overlap in expertise amongst the three LIA's, each entity has established where they will conduct most of their work. UCCE will train teachers and youth in qualifying schools throughout San Mateo County, including the rural communities on the coast of La Honda and Pescadero. They will also provide SLM with schools in Daly City, South San Francisco, and Redwood City. The LHD will work during the school day to provide nutrition education, and CCC will work in summer youth programs settings in East Palo Alto. Furthermore, the LHD will work in areas where CX3 interventions will occur, namely in East Palo Alto and Redwood City. The LHD will also work to improve the implementation of wellness policies by providing technical assistance to qualifying schools and preschools.

The curriculum chosen for direct education consists of Practice and Research tested (All) and Emerging (UCCE) and were chosen after feedback from implementing staff, teachers, and PRE/POST results from evaluations from the previous years evaluation. In addition, implementing agencies will continue to follow guidance from the SNAP-Ed Interventions: A Toolkit for States to assure that all interventions meet quality assurance.

Targeted interventions are the result of coordinated efforts to build and establish relationships in SNAP-Ed eligible communities and settings. Interventions are often conducted through partnerships with our subcontractors, other county departments, and the CNAP group which meets on a bi-monthly basis. Media highlights will be shared with relevant partners and the SNAP-Ed community by partnering with the public relations department for the county to post on the San Mateo County WIC website, and our subcontactors to post NEOP messages when they become available. The latter details the work of each entity and it's relation to the state level objectives.

School Wellness (State objectives 1-5)

School Wellness is a large focus for both the LHD and UCCE. Both agencies will provide direct education in a classroom setting and will provide further opportunities for students to correlate nutrition with health by offering garden based nutrition education, SLM, training to teachers, training and technical assistance to after school providers, and physical education opportunities in preschools.

The LHD, UCCE, and CCC will provide nutrition education to SNAP-Ed eligible schools, afterschool, and summer programs through education, environmental supports and staff wellness.

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In collaboration with the Sequoia Health Care District, the LHD and UCCE will combine efforts to assist in hosting "Make Time for Fitness". This annual event brings 4th graders from schools which meet the 50% free and reduced meal guideline to one location to address the importance of fitness and nutritious eating in a day of education and play.

In addition, we will continue to celebrate the month of March, National Nutrition Month, by expanding our outreach to further emphasize the importance of nutritious eating to the SNAP-Ed eligible population.

Farm to School (State objectives 1,3, and 4)

Both UCCE and the LHD will continue participating in the Farm to Institution subcommittee of the San Mateo County Food System Alliance in order to promote Farm to School efforts in SNAP-Ed eligible schools. Efforts will include providing linkages to nutrition education and promoting consumption of locally procured, healthy foods. Food tasting and cafeteria promotions will include locally grown produce items.

Garden Education (State objective 3)

CCC will revitalize and maintain a garden during the summer months. During other times of the year, the garden will continue to be maintained by the site staff which will allow for larger community engagement. Education regarding the food growing process will increase the knowledge of food systems. The *Learn, Grow, Eat, & Go* curriculum will help instill an appreciation for local produce. Students will harvest seasonal produce such as tomatoes, cucumbers, and bell peppers.

UCCE will continue its collaboration with UCCE 4-H San Mateo County and the Healthy Living Ambassador (HLA) program to establish/reinvigorate/maintain edible school and community gardens. They will also implement garden-based nutrition education lessons reaching the students in SNAP-Ed eligible afterschool programs across the county. Local teens will be recruited from both qualifying UC CalFresh nutrition education sites and the larger community of San Mateo County to participate in a weekend long intensive training to be held at UC Elkus Ranch. Following the weekend training, they will lead a ten week series of Learn Grow, Eat & Go!

Additionally, UCCE will support the delivery of other garden-based nutrition education curriculum in classrooms and preschool classrooms across the county resulting in additional site improvements associated to the garden. UCCE adult workshops at school and preschool sites will utilize items grown in the garden to implement lessons from the *Fresh From the Garden* curriculum which is designed to increase knowledge of healthful eating habits, while emphasizing the health benefits associated with a vegetable-rich diet. UCCE will continue to be supported by UCCE Master Gardeners who provide technical assistance regarding topics such as: companion planting, microclimate concerns, and planting schedules.

The LHD will continue to build on established garden education by partnering with both elementary and preschools to start, improve, and maintain garden beds at eligible sites. Program staff will expand their efforts to reach a broader range of students at current garden locations and will continue to use curriculum such

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as *Dig In*, and *The Great Garden Detective*. Furthermore, the LHD will encourage participating SHINE sites to extend their work to encompass garden education as an additional site improvement. The LHD will work with program staff at school sites to train and provide ongoing technical assistance.

Cx3 (State Level objectives 1,2,3, and 4)

The CX3 measuring survey tools will continue to be a key assessment in determining the connection between neighborhood factors (such as walkability, the interior/ exterior appearance of stores (including advertisement), to health outcomes. The LHD will carry out a reassessment of large supermarket chains, large grocery stores, small markets and convenient corner stores within four census tracts that continue to qualify under the Geographic Information system (GIS) data tool. Data will yield results inclusive but not limited to the quality and variety of fruits and vegetables, the selection of items at the checkout/ counter lane, health promotion items around fruit and vegetable displays, and cost to name a few. The LHD will train and provide technical assistance to a local youth group to carry out the CX3 assessment tool and provide feedback to the LHD. The assessment will be carried out in ten stores in Redwood City, eight stores in East Palo Alto, and two in Menlo Park. Findings will be shared with community organizations, residents and county departments for potential collaboration to address needs.

Healthy Retail (State Level objectives 1,3 and 4)

The Healthy Retail component will occur as a result of CX3 findings that will indicate where we can make improvements in the retail stores. Based on findings from 2013 data, only 25% of stores surveyed met the quality standard, and only 1/3 sold quality produce. Our multi-year strategies and interventions for the next three years include utilizing the Social Ecological Framework (SEM) to address nutrition decisions made in retail establishments by 1. Reducing advertisements of sugar sweetened commodity food and beverages on the exterior of stores (year one and two) 2. Improving the number of stores that meet the quality standard by 5% 3. Securing partnerships that can allow for smaller more frequent delivery of food (year two and three) for fresher produce.

Champions (State level objectives 1,2,4,and 5)

Completion of state deliverables would not be possible without the involvement of local community Champions who assist the LHD to identify both site and intervention needs. The LHD will expand their current efforts with Champions to align with state's Champions for Change initiative to recruit and train additional

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church leaders, youth advocates, teachers, and school administration so that it encompasses the framework of SEM. Champions will serve as the cornerstone of our work by being the point of contact for SNAP-Ed eligible sites. They will also participate in relevant Champion trainings that encourage implementation of PSE and expand efforts to include other pertinent strategies.

Access to and/or appeal of physical activity opportunities (State level objective 5)

Catholic Charities will incorporate a physical activity component to give the participants a comprehensive approach to health. The curriculum *CATCH* will be followed when implementing lesson plans. *CATCH* will also be utilized during lessons taught by a physical education instructor. Program goals include: reducing risk factors associated with diabetes, depression, and obesity amongst youth in East Palo Alto, and sharing opportunities to be involved in physical activity since many of them do not have access to a safe space. The physical activity component will be monitored by survey to evaluate the progress of the participants. Students are also surveyed to track their progress outside of the site.

Additionally, UCCE San Mateo County has identified one nutrition educator who will serve as the physical activity lead for the county. The physical activity lead received extensive training on the *CATCH* curriculum and will guide efforts to train community partners on this curriculum and generally support physical activity promotion in SNAP-Ed eligible sites. UCCE will also partner with the 4-H Healthy Living Ambassadors and other local teens to lead physical activity lessons in both afterschool programs and preschool settings.

Evaluation Narrative Summary:

LHD

The LHD will participate in several strategies to foster behavior change among SNAP-Ed eligible residents, and will document such strategies by providing evaluation outcomes. Policy, Systems and Environmental (PSE) changes that have occurred as a result of focused efforts to promote health access and close health disparities will be captured through the Re-AIM framework. The RE-AIM framework will highlight the number of indirect participants reached, the scope of impact and address the sustainability of the PSE.

The LHD will also track and document all direct (unduplicated) and indirect (duplicated) education through the USDA Education and Administrative Reporting System (EARS). Direct and indirect education will occur in diverse community settings where SNAP-Ed eligible residents live, learn, and shop. EARS will capture

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the number of participants, give a description of the lesson taught, provide the length of the lesson and also indicate relevant SNAP-Ed materials and curriculum that were used. In addition, EARS will capture the number of lessons and classes taught to fulfill the Income and Outcome evaluation. Grades 3-8 will use the Youth Nutrition and Physical Activity Survey.

UCCE

UC CalFresh utilizes research-based age specific curricula in the classroom with youth participants. The Teacher Observation Tool (TOT) and the Teacher Tasting Tool (TTT) are the two most commonly used tools in the UC CalFresh youth program. The TTT surveys the student's ability to assess whether the students have ever tasted the food offered in a taste test before as well as their willingness to try the food again. The TOT surveys teachers to assess their perception of students' behavior change concerning healthy foods and physical activity as well as their own change in behavior in regards to encouraging students to consume healthy foods and participate in physical activity. At schools where the Smarter Lunchrooms Movement techniques are implemented, a pre & post scorecard will be used to document the changes.

UC CalFresh's adult evaluation's include pre and post tests specific to adult research-based curricula in series-based lessons such as *Plan, Shop, Save and Cook*. These assessments measure knowledge gain and behavior change. For single session workshops, UC CalFresh utilizes intent to change (ITC) surveys to measure the participants' readiness to change behavior. Single session workshops also collect qualitative success stories. For process evaluation, UC CalFresh submits quarterly reporting tools youth and adult workbooks with number of participants and site details. UCCE will be working with UC CalFresh state office to align evaluation tools to the Western Region's SNAP-Ed evaluation framework.

CCC

Catholic Charities will implement the Cooking Matters and *Learn Grow, Eat Go!* at Youth Club of St. Francis of the Assisi in East Palo Alto. The Youth Survey will be administered as a pre and post tool to evaluate effectiveness and behavior changes. In addition, The CCC will track and document all direct (unduplicated) and indirect (duplicated) education through the USDA education and Administrative Reporting System (EARS).

1. Invoicing and Payment

- A. Upon completion of project activies as provided in Exhibit A Grant Application, and upon receipt and approval of the invoices, the State agrees to reimburse the Grantee for activities performed and expenditures incurred in accordance with the costs specified herein.
- B. Invoices shall include the Grant Number and shall be submitted in triplicate not more frequently than quarterly in arrears to:

C. Invoices shall:

- Be prepared on Grantee letterhead. If invoices are not on produced letterhead invoices must be signed by an authorized official, employee or agent certifying that the expenditures claimed represent activities performed and are in accordance with Exhibit A Grant Application under this Grant.
- 2) Bear the Grantee's name as shown on the Grant.
- 3) Identify the billing and/or performance period covered by the invoice.
- 4) Itemize costs for the billing period in the same or greater level of detail as indicated in this Grant. Subject to the terms of this Grant, reimbursement may only be sought for those costs and/or cost categories expressly identified as allowable and approved by CDPH.

2. Budget Contingency Clause

- A. It is mutually agreed that if the Budget Act of the current year and/or any subsequent years covered under this Agreement does not appropriate sufficient funds for the program, this Agreement shall be of no further force and effect. In this event, the State shall have no liability to pay any funds whatsoever to Grantee or to furnish any other considerations under this Agreement and Grantee shall not be obligated to fulfill any provisions of this Agreement.
- B. If funding for any fiscal year is reduced or deleted by the Budget Act for purposes of this program, the State shall have the option to either cancel this Agreement with no liability occurring to the State, or offer an agreement amendment to Grantee to reflect the reduced amount.

3. **Prompt Payment Clause**

Payment will be made in accordance with, and within the time specified in, Government Code Chapter 4.5, commencing with Section 927.

4. Amounts Payable

- A. The amounts payable under this Grant shall not exceed:
 - 1) \$635,606 for the budget period of 10/1/16 through 9/30/17.
 - 2) \$635,606 for the budget period of 10/1/17 through 9/30/18.
 - 3) \$635,606 for the budget period of 10/1/18 through 9/30/19.
- B. Payment allocations shall be made for allowable expenses up to the amount annually encumbered commensurate with the state fiscal year in which services are fulfilled and/or goods are received.

5. Timely Submission of Final Invoice

- A. A final undisputed invoice shall be submitted for payment no more than sixty (60) calendar days following the expiration or termination date of this Grant, unless a later or alternate deadline is agreed to in writing by the program grant manager. Said invoice should be clearly marked "Final Invoice", indicating that all payment obligations of the State under this Grant have ceased and that no further payments are due or outstanding.
- B. The State may, at its discretion, choose not to honor any delinquent final invoice if the Grantee fails to obtain prior written State approval of an alternate final invoice submission deadline.

6. Travel and Per Diem Reimbursement

Any reimbursement for necessary travel and per diem shall be at the rates currently in effect as established by the California Department of Human Resources (CalHR).

EXHIBIT C

STANDARD GRANT CONDITIONS

- 1. APPROVAL: This Grant is of no force or effect until signed by both parties and approved by the Department of General Services, if required. The Grantee may not commence performance until such approval has been obtained
- 2. **AMENDMENT:** No amendment or variation of the terms of this Grant shall be valid unless made in writing, signed by the parties, and approved as required. No oral understanding or Agreement not incorporated in the Grant is binding on any of the parties. In no case shall the Department materially alter the scope of the Project set forth in Exhibit A.
- **3. ASSIGNMENT:** This Grant is not assignable by the Grantee, either in whole or in part, without the written consent of the Grant Manager in the form of a written amendment to the Grant.
- 4. AUDIT: Grantee agrees that the Department, the Bureau of State Audits, or their designated representative shall have the right to review and to copy any records and supporting documentation pertaining to this Grant. Grantee agrees to maintain such records for a possible audit for a minimum of three (3) years after final payment or completion of the project funded with this Grant, unless a longer period of records retention is stipulated. Grantee agrees to allow the auditor(s) access to such records during normal business hours and to allow interviews of any employees who might reasonably have information related to such records. Further, Grantee agrees to include a similar right of the State to audit records and interview staff in any subcontract related to the project.
- **5. CONFLICT OF INTEREST:** Grantee certifies that it is in compliance with all applicable state and/or federal conflict of interest laws.
- 6. **INDEMNIFICATION:** Grantee agrees to indemnify, defend and save harmless the State, its officers, agents and employees from any and all claims and losses accruing or resulting to any and all contractors, subcontractors, suppliers, laborers, and any other person, firm or corporation furnishing or supplying work services, materials, or supplies in connection with the project, and from any and all claims and losses accruing or resulting to any person, firm or corporation who may be injured or damaged by Grantee in the performance of any activities related to the Project.

7. FISCAL MANAGEMENT SYSTEMS AND ACCOUNTING STANDARDS:

Grantee agrees that, at a minimum, its fiscal control and accounting procedures will be sufficient to permit tracing of all grant funds to a level of expenditure adequate to establish that such funds have not been used in violation of any applicable state or federal law, or the provisions of this Grant. Grantee further agrees that it will maintain separate Project accounts in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.

- **8. GOVERNING LAW:** This Grant is governed by and shall be interpreted in accordance with the laws of the State of California.
- **9. INCOME RESTRICTIONS:** Grantee agrees that any refunds, rebates, credits, or other amounts (including any interest thereon) accruing to or received by the Grantee under this Grant shall be paid by the Grantee to the Department, to the extent that they are properly allocable to costs for which the Grantee has been reimbursed by the Department under this Grant.
- **10. INDEPENDENT GRANTEE:** Grantee, and its agents and employees of Grantee, in the performance of the Project, shall act in an independent capacity and not as officers, employees or agents of the Department.
- 11. **MEDIA EVENTS:** Grantee shall notify the Department's Grant Manager in writing at least twenty (20) working days before any public or media event publicizing the accomplishments and/or results of the Project and provide the opportunity for attendance and participation by Department's representatives.
- **12. NO THIRD-PARTY RIGHTS:** The Department and Grantee do not intend to create any rights or remedies for any third- party as a beneficiary of this Grant or the project.
- **13. NOTICE:** Grantee shall promptly notify the Department's Grant Manager in writing of any events, developments or changes that could affect the completion of the project or the budget approved for this Grant.
- **14. PROFESSIONALS:** Grantee agrees that only licensed professionals will be used to perform services under this Grant where such services are called for.

- **15. RECORDS:** Grantee certifies that it will maintain Project accounts in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. Grantee further certifies that it will comply with the following conditions for a grant award as set forth in the Request for Applications (Exhibit D) and the Grant Application (Exhibit A).
 - Establish an official file for the Project which shall adequately document all significant actions relative to the Project;
 - Establish separate accounts which will adequately and accurately depict all amounts received and expended on this Project, including all grant funds received under this Grant;
 - Establish separate accounts which will adequately depict all income received which is attributable to the Project, especially including any income attributable to grant funds disbursed under this Grant;
 - Establish an accounting system which will adequately depict final total costs of the Project, including both direct and indirect costs; and,
 - Establish such accounts and maintain such records as may be necessary for the state to fulfill federal reporting requirements, including any and all reporting requirements under federal tax statutes or regulations.
- **16. RELATED LITIGATION:** Under no circumstances may Grantee use funds from any disbursement under this Grant to pay for costs associated with any litigation between the Grantee and the Department.
- 17. RIGHTS IN DATA: Grantee and the Department agree that all data, plans, drawings, specifications, reports, computer programs, operating manuals, notes, and other written or graphic work submitted under Exhibit A in the performance of the Project funded by this Grant shall be in the public domain. Grantee may disclose, disseminate and use in whole or in part, any final form data and information received, collected, and developed under this Project, subject to appropriate acknowledgment of credit to the Department for financial support. Grantee shall not utilize the materials submitted to the Department (except data) for any profit making venture or sell or grant rights to a third-party who intends to do so. The Department has the right to use submitted data for all governmental purposes.
- **18. VENUE:** The Department and Grantee agree that any action arising out of this Grant shall be filed and maintained in the Superior Court, County of Sacramento, California. Grantee waives any existing sovereign immunity for the purposes of this Grant, if applicable.

1. Additional Incorporated Documents

- A. The following documents and any subsequent updates are not attached, but are incorporated herein and made a part hereof by this reference. These documents may be updated periodically by CDPH, as required by program directives. CDPH shall provide the Grantee with copies of said documents and any periodic updates thereto, under separate cover. CDPH will maintain on file, all documents referenced herein and any subsequent updates.

2. Cancellation / Termination

- A. This Grant may be cancelled by CDPH <u>without cause</u> upon thirty (30) calendar days advance written notice to the Grantee.
- B. CDPH reserves the right to cancel or terminate this Grant immediately <u>for cause</u>. The Grantee may submit a written request to terminate this Grant only if CDPH substantially fails to perform its responsibilities as provided herein.
- C. The term "for cause" shall mean that the Grantee fails to meet the terms, conditions, and/or responsibilities of this agreement. Causes for termination include, but are not limited to the following occurrences:
 - 1) If the Grantee knowingly furnishes any statement, representation, warranty, or certification in connection with the agreement, which representation is materially false, deceptive, incorrect, or incomplete.
 - 2) If the Grantee fails to perform any material requirement of this Grant or defaults in performance of this agreement.
 - 3) If the Grantee files for bankruptcy, or if CDPH determines that the Grantee becomes financially incapable of completing this agreement.
- D. Grant termination or cancellation shall be effective as of the date indicated in CDPH's notification to the Grantee. The notice shall stipulate any final performance, invoicing or payment requirements.
- E. In the event of early termination or cancellation, the Grantee shall be entitled to compensation for services performed satisfactorily under this agreement and expenses

incurred up to the date of cancellation and any non-cancelable obligations incurred in support of this Grant.

- F. In the event of termination, and at the request of CDPH, the Grantee shall furnish copies of all proposals, specifications, designs, procedures, layouts, copy, and other materials related to the services or deliverables provided under this Grant, whether finished or in progress on the termination date.
- G. The Grantee will not be entitled to reimbursement for any expenses incurred for services and deliverables pursuant to this agreement after the effective date of termination.
- H. Upon receipt of notification of termination of this Grant, and except as otherwise specified by CDPH, the Grantee shall:
 - 1) Place no further order or subgrants for materials, services, or facilities.
 - 2) Settle all outstanding liabilities and all claims arising out of such termination of orders and subgrants.
 - 3) Upon the effective date of termination of the Grant and the payment by CDPH of all items properly changeable to CDPH hereunder, Grantee shall transfer, assign and make available to CDPH all property and materials belonging to CDPH, all rights and claims to any and all reservations, grants, and arrangements with owners of media/PR materials, or others, and shall make available to CDPH all written information regarding CDPH's media/PR materials, and no extra compensation is to be paid to Grantee for its services.
 - 4) Take such action as may be necessary, or as CDPH may specify, to protect and preserve any property related to this agreement which is in the possession of the Grantee and in which CDPH has or may acquire an interest.
- I. CDPH may, at its discretion, require the Grantee to cease performance of certain components of the Scope of Work as designated by CDPH and complete performance of other components prior to the termination date of the Grant.

3. Avoidance of Conflicts of Interest by Grantee

- A. CDPH intends to avoid any real or apparent conflict of interest on the part of the Grantee, subgrants, or employees, officers and directors of the Grantee or subgrants. Thus, CDPH reserves the right to determine, at its sole discretion, whether any information, assertion or claim received from any source indicates the existence of a real or apparent conflict of interest; and, if a conflict is found to exist, to require the Grantee to submit additional information or a plan for resolving the conflict, subject to CDPH review and prior approval.
- B. Conflicts of interest include, but are not limited to:
 - 1) An instance where the Grantee or any of its subgrants, or any employee, officer, or director of the Grantee or any subgrant or has an interest, financial or otherwise,

whereby the use or disclosure of information obtained while performing services under the grant would allow for private or personal benefit or for any purpose that is contrary to the goals and objectives of the grant.

- 2) An instance where the Grantee's or any subgrant's employees, officers, or directors use their positions for purposes that are, or give the appearance of being, motivated by a desire for private gain for themselves or others, such as those with whom they have family, business or other ties.
- C. If CDPH is or becomes aware of a known or suspected conflict of interest, the Grantee will be given an opportunity to submit additional information or to resolve the conflict. A Grantee with a suspected conflict of interest will have five (5) working days from the date of notification of the conflict by CDPH to provide complete information regarding the suspected conflict. If a conflict of interest is determined to exist by CDPH and cannot be resolved to the satisfaction of CDPH, the conflict will be grounds for terminating the grant. CDPH may, at its discretion upon receipt of a written request from the Grantee, authorize an extension of the timeline indicated herein.

The terms "Grantee" and "SubGrantee" shall also mean, "agreement", "grant", "grant agreement", "Grantee" and "Subgrantee" respectively.

The terms "California Department of Public Health" and "CDPH" shall have the same meaning and refer to the California State agency that is a party to this Agreement.

This exhibit contains provisions that require strict adherence to various contracting laws and policies.

It is mutually understood between the parties that this Grant may have been written before ascertaining the availability of congressional appropriation of funds, for the mutual benefit of both parties, in order to avoid program and fiscal delays which would occur if the Grant were executed after that determination was made.
- b. This Grant is valid and enforceable only if sufficient funds are made available to the State by the United States Government for the fiscal years covered by the term of this Grant. In addition, this Grant is subject to any additional restrictions, limitations, or conditions enacted by the Congress or any statute enacted by the Congress which may affect the provisions, terms or funding of this Grant in any manner.
- c. It is mutually agreed that if the Congress does not appropriate sufficient funds for the program, this Grant shall be amended to reflect any reduction in funds.
- d. CDPH has the option to invalidate or cancel the Grant with 30-days advance written notice or to amend the Grant to reflect any reduction in funds.

2. Federal Equal Opportunity Requirements

(Applicable to all federally funded grants entered into by the California Department of Public Health (CDPH) formerly known as California Department of Health Services (CDHS).)

- a. The Grantee will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, color, religion, sex, national origin, physical or mental handicap, disability, age or status as a disabled veteran or veteran of the Vietnam era. Such notices shall state the Grantee's obligation under the law to take affirmative action to employ and advance in employment qualified applicants without discrimination based on their race, color, religion, sex, national origin physical or mental handicap, disability, age or status as a disabled veteran or veteran of the Vietnam era and the rights of applicants and employees.
- b. The Grantee will, in all solicitations or advancements for employees placed by or on behalf of the Grantee, state that all qualified applicants will receive consideration for employment without regard to race, color, religion, sex, national origin physical or mental handicap, disability, age or status as a disabled veteran or veteran of the Vietnam era.
- c. The Grantee will send to each labor union or representative of workers with which it has a collective bargaining agreement or other contract or understanding a notice, to be provided by the Federal Government or the State, advising the labor union or workers' representative of the Grantee's commitments under the provisions herein and shall post copies of the notice in conspicuous places available to employees and applicants for employment.
- d. The Grantee will comply with all provisions of and furnish all information and reports required by Section 503 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended, the Vietnam Era Veterans' Readjustment Assistance Act of 1974 (38 U.S.C. 4212) and of the Federal Executive Order No. 11246 as amended, including by Executive Order 11375, 'Amending Executive Order 11246 Relating to Equal Employment Opportunity,' and as supplemented by regulation at 41 CFR part 60, "Office of the Federal Contract Compliance

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Programs, Equal Employment Opportunity, Department of Labor," and of the rules, regulations, and relevant orders of the Secretary of Labor.

- e. The Grantee will furnish all information and reports required by Federal Executive Order No. 11246 as amended, including by Executive Order 11375, 'Amending Executive Order 11246 Relating to Equal Employment Opportunity,' and as supplemented by regulation at 41 CFR part 60, "Office of the Federal Contract Compliance Programs, Equal Employment Opportunity, Department of Labor," and the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, and by the rules, regulations, and orders of the Secretary of Labor, or pursuant thereto, and will permit access to its books, records, and accounts by the State and its designated representatives and the Secretary of Labor for purposes of investigation to ascertain compliance with such rules, regulations, and orders.
- f. In the event of the Grantee's noncompliance with the requirements of the provisions herein or with any federal rules, regulations, or orders which are referenced herein, this Agreement may be cancelled, terminated, or suspended in whole or in part and the Grantee may be declared ineligible for further federal and state contracts in accordance with procedures authorized in Federal Executive Order No. 11246 as amended and such other sanctions may be imposed and remedies invoked as provided in Federal Executive Order No. 11246 as amended, including by Executive Order 11375, 'Amending Executive Order 11246 Relating to Equal Employment Opportunity,' and as supplemented by regulation at 41 CFR part 60, "Office of the Federal Contract Compliance Programs, Equal Employment Opportunity, Department of Labor," or by rule, regulation, or order of the Secretary of Labor, or as otherwise provided by law.
- g. The Grantee will include the provisions of Paragraphs a through g in every subcontract or purchase order unless exempted by rules, regulations, or orders of the Secretary of Labor issued pursuant to Federal Executive Order No. 11246 as amended, including by Executive Order 11375, 'Amending Executive Order 11246 Relating to Equal Employment Opportunity,' and as supplemented by regulation at 41 CFR part 60, "Office of the Federal Contract Compliance Programs, Equal Employment Opportunity, Department of Labor," or Section 503 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 or (38 U.S.C. 4212) of the Vietnam Era Veteran's Readjustment Assistance Act, so that such provisions will be binding upon each subGrantee or vendor. The Grantee will take such action with respect to any subcontract or purchase order as the Director of the Office of Federal Contract Compliance Programs or CDPH may direct as a means of enforcing such provisions including sanctions for noncompliance provided, however, that in the event the Grantee becomes involved in, or is threatened with litigation by a subGrantee or vendor as a result of such direction by CDPH, the Grantee may request in writing to CDPH, who, in turn, may request the United States to enter into such litigation to protect the interests of the State and of the United States.

3. Debarment and Suspension Certification

- a. By signing this Grant, the Grantee/Grantee agrees to comply with applicable federal suspension and debarment regulations including, but not limited to 7 CFR Part 3017, 45 CFR 76, 40 CFR 32 or 34 CFR 85.
- b. By signing this Grant, the Grantee certifies to the best of its knowledge and belief, that it and its principals:
 - (1) Are not presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible, or voluntarily excluded by any federal department or agency;
 - (2) Have not within a three-year period preceding this application/proposal/agreement been convicted of or had a civil judgment rendered against them for commission of fraud or a criminal offense in connection with obtaining, attempting to obtain, or performing a public (Federal, State or local) transaction or contract under a public transaction; violation of Federal or State antitrust statutes or commission of embezzlement, theft, forgery, bribery, falsification or destruction of records, making false statements, or receiving stolen property;
 - (3) Are not presently indicted for or otherwise criminally or civilly charged by a governmental entity (Federal, State or local) with commission of any of the offenses enumerated in Paragraph b(2) herein; and

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- (4) Have not within a three-year period preceding this application/proposal/agreement had one or more public transactions (Federal, State or local) terminated for cause or default.
- (5) Shall not knowingly enter into any lower tier covered transaction with a person who is proposed for debarment under federal regulations (i.e., 48 CFR part 9, subpart 9.4), debarred, suspended, declared ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from participation in such transaction, unless authorized by the State.
- (6) Will include a clause entitled, "Debarment and Suspension Certification" that essentially sets forth the provisions herein, in all lower tier covered transactions and in all solicitations for lower tier covered transactions.
- c. If the Grantee is unable to certify to any of the statements in this certification, the Grantee shall submit an explanation to the CDPH Program Contract Manager.
- d. The terms and definitions herein have the meanings set out in the Definitions and Coverage sections of the rules implementing Federal Executive Order 12549.
- e. If the Grantee knowingly violates this certification, in addition to other remedies available to the Federal Government, the CDPH may terminate this Agreement for cause or default.

4. Covenant Against Contingent Fees

The Grantee warrants that no person or selling agency has been employed or retained to solicit/secure this Grant upon an agreement of understanding for a commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingent fee, except bona fide employees or bona fide established commercial or selling agencies retained by the Grantee for the purpose of securing business. For breach or violation of this warranty, CDPH shall have the right to annul this Grant without liability or in its discretion to deduct from the Grant price or consideration, or otherwise recover, the full amount of such commission, percentage, and brokerage or contingent fee.

5. Air or Water Pollution Requirements

Any federally funded grant and/or subgrants in excess of \$100,000 must comply with the following provisions unless said grant is exempt under 40 CFR 15.5.

- a. Government Grantees agree to comply with all applicable standards, orders, or requirements issued under section 306 of the Clean Air Act [42 U.S.C. 1857(h)], section 508 of the Clean Water Act (33 U.S.C. 1368), Executive Order 11738, and Environmental Protection Agency regulations (40 CFR part 15).
- b. Institutions of higher education, hospitals, nonprofit organizations and commercial businesses agree to comply with all applicable standards, orders, or requirements issued under the Clean Air Act (42 U.S.C. 7401 et seq.), as amended, and the Federal Water Pollution Control Act (33 U.S.C. 1251 et seq.), as amended.

6. Lobbying Restrictions and Disclosure Certification

(Applicable to federally funded grants in excess of \$100,000 per Section 1352 of the 31, U.S.C.)

- a. Certification and Disclosure Requirements
 - (1) Each person (or recipient) who requests or receives a grant, subgrant, which is subject to Section 1352 of the 31, U.S.C., and which exceeds \$100,000 at any tier, shall file a certification (in the form set forth in Attachment 1, consisting of one page, entitled "Certification Regarding Lobbying") that the recipient has not made, and will not make, any payment prohibited by Paragraph b of this provision.
 - (2) Each recipient shall file a disclosure (in the form set forth in Attachment 2, entitled "Standard Form-LLL 'disclosure of Lobbying Activities'") if such recipient has made or has agreed to make any payment using nonappropriated funds (to include profits from any covered federal action) in connection with a grant or any extension or amendment of that grant, which would be prohibited under Paragraph b of this provision if paid for with appropriated funds.

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- (3) Each recipient shall file a disclosure form at the end of each calendar quarter in which there occurs any event that requires disclosure or that materially affect the accuracy of the information contained in any disclosure form previously filed by such person under Paragraph a(2) herein. An event that materially affects the accuracy of the information reported includes:
 - (a) A cumulative increase of \$25,000 or more in the amount paid or expected to be paid for influencing or attempting to influence a covered federal action;
 - (b) A change in the person(s) or individuals(s) influencing or attempting to influence a covered federal action; or
 - (c) A change in the officer(s), employee(s), or member(s) contacted for the purpose of influencing or attempting to influence a covered federal action.
- (4) Each person (or recipient) who requests or receives from a person referred to in Paragraph a(1) of this provision a grant or subgrant exceeding \$100,000 at any tier under a grant shall file a certification, and a disclosure form, if required, to the next tier above.
- (5) All disclosure forms (but not certifications) shall be forwarded from tier to tier until received by the person referred to in Paragraph a(1) of this provision. That person shall forward all disclosure forms to CDPH Program Contract Manager.

b. Prohibition

Section 1352 of Title 31, U.S.C., provides in part that no appropriated funds may be expended by the recipient of a federal contract or agreement, grant, loan, or cooperative agreement to pay any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with any of the following covered federal actions: the awarding of any federal contract or agreement, the making of any federal grant, the making of any federal loan, entering into of any cooperative agreement, and the extension, continuation, renewal, amendment, or modification of any federal contract or agreement, grant, loan, or cooperative agreement.

7. Additional Restrictions

Grantee shall comply with the restrictions under Division F, Title V, Section 503 of the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2012 (H.R. 2055), which provides that:

"SEC. 503.(a) No part of any appropriation contained in this Act or transferred pursuant to section 4002 of Public Law 111–148 shall be used, other than for normal and recognized executive-legislative relationships, for publicity or propaganda purposes, for the preparation, distribution, or use of any kit, pamphlet, booklet, publication, electronic communication, radio, television, or video presentation designed to support or defeat the enactment of legislation before the Congress or any State or local legislature or legislative body, except in presentation to the Congress or any State or local legislature itself, or designed to support or defeat any proposed or pending regulation, administrative action, or order issued by the executive branch of any State or local government, except in presentation to the executive branch of any State or local government itself.

- (b) No part of any appropriation contained in this Act or transferred pursuant to section 4002 of Public Law 111–148 shall be used to pay the salary or expenses of any grant or contract recipient, or agent acting for such recipient, related to any activity designed to influence the enactment of legislation, appropriations, regulation, administrative action, or Executive order proposed or pending before the Congress or any State government, State legislature or local legislature or legislative body, other than for normal and recognized executive-legislative relationships or participation by an agency or officer of a State, local or tribal government in policymaking and administrative processes within the executive branch of that government.
- (c) The prohibitions in subsections (a) and (b) shall include any activity to advocate or promote any

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proposed, pending or future Federal, State or local tax increase, or any proposed, pending, or future requirement or restriction on any legal consumer product, including its sale or marketing, including but not limited to the advocacy or promotion of gun control."

8. Human Subjects Use Requirements

(Applicable only to federally funded agreements in which performance, directly or through a subcontract/subaward, includes any tests or examination of materials derived from the human body.)

By signing this Agreement, Contractor agrees that if any performance under this Agreement or any subcontract or subagreement includes any tests or examination of materials derived from the human body for the purpose of providing information, diagnosis, prevention, treatment or assessment of disease, impairment, or health of a human being, all locations at which such examinations are performed shall meet the requirements of 42 U.S.C. Section 263a (CLIA) and the regulations thereunder.

9. Financial and Compliance Audit Requirements

By signing this Agreement, the Contractor/Subcontrac tor agrees to abide by all requirements specified in 2 CFR 200 *et seq.*, 2 CFR *et seq.*, as applicable, including but not limited to obtaing an annual audit, and any subsequent federal regulatory additions or revisions.

- a. The definitions used in this provision are contained in Section 38040 of the Health and Safety Code, which by this reference is made a part hereof.
- b. Direct service contract means a contract or agreement for services contained in local assistance or subvention programs or both (see Health and Safety [H&S] Code section 38020). Direct service contracts shall not include contracts, agreements, grants, or subventions to other governmental agencies or units of government nor contracts or agreements with regional centers or area agencies on aging (H&S Code section 38030).
- c. The Contractor, as indicated below, agrees to obtain one of the following audits:
 - (1) If the Contractor is a nonprofit organization (as defined in H&S Code section 38040) and receives \$25,000 or more from any State agency under a direct service contract or agreement; the Contractor agrees to obtain an annual single, organization wide, financial and compliance audit. Said audit shall be conducted according to Generally Accepted Auditing Standards. This audit does not fulfill the audit requirements of Paragraph c(3) below. The audit shall be completed by the 15th day of the fifth month following the end of the Contractor's fiscal year, and/or
 - (2) If the Contractor is a nonprofit organization (as defined in H&S Code section 38040) and receives less than \$25,000 per year from any State agency under a direct service contract or agreement, the Contractor agrees to obtain a biennial single, organization wide financial and compliance audit, unless there is evidence of fraud or other violation of state law in connection with this Agreement. This audit does not fulfill the audit requirements of Paragraph c(3) below. The audit shall be completed by the 15th day of the fifth month following the end of the Contractor's fiscal year, and/or
 - (3) If the Contractor is a State or Local Government entity or Nonprofit organization (as defined in 2CFR Part 200) and expends \$750,000 or more in Federal awards, the Contractor agrees to obtain an annual single, organization wide, financial and compliance audit according to the requirements specified in 2CFR Part 200. An audit conducted pursuant to this provision will fulfill the audit requirements outlined in Paragraphs c(1) and c(2) above. The audit shall be completed by the end of the ninth month following the end of the audit period. The requirements of this provision apply if:
 - (a) The Contractor is a recipient expending Federal awards received directly from Federal awarding agencies, or
 - (b) The Contractor is a subrecipient expending Federal awards received from a pass-through entity such as the State, County or community based organization.

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- (4) If the Contractor submits to CDPH a report of an audit other than a single audit, the Contractor must also submit a certification indicating the Contractor has not expended \$750,000 or more in federal funds for the year covered by the audit report.
- d. Two copies of the audit report shall be delivered to the CDPH program funding this Agreement. The audit report must identify the Contractor's legal name and the number assigned to this Agreement. The audit report shall be due within 30 days after the completion of the audit. Upon receipt of said audit report, the CDPH Program Contract Manager shall forward the audit report to CDPH's Audits and Investigations Unit if the audit report was submitted under Section 16.c(3), unless the audit report is from a City, County, or Special District within the State of California whereby the report will be retained by the funding program.
- e. The cost of the audits described herein may be included in the funding for this Agreement up to the proportionate amount this Agreement represents of the Contractor's total revenue. The CDPH program funding this Agreement must provide advance written approval of the specific amount allowed for said audit expenses.
- f. The State or its authorized designee, including the Bureau of State Audits, is responsible for conducting agreement performance audits which are not financial and compliance audits. Performance audits are defined by Generally Accepted Government Auditing Standards.
- g. Nothing in this Agreement limits the State's responsibility or authority to enforce State law or regulations, procedures, or reporting requirements arising thereto.
- h. Nothing in this provision limits the authority of the State to make audits of this Agreement, provided however, that if independent audits arranged for by the Contractor meet Generally Accepted Governmental Auditing Standards, the State shall rely on those audits and any additional audit work and shall build upon the work already done.
- i. The State may, at its option, direct its own auditors to perform either of the audits described above. The Contractor will be given advance written notification, if the State chooses to exercise its option to perform said audits.
- j. The Contractor shall include a clause in any agreement the Contractor enters into with the audit firm doing the single organization wide audit to provide access by the State or Federal Government to the working papers of the independent auditor who prepares the single organization wide audit for the Contractor.
- k. Federal or state auditors shall have "expanded scope auditing" authority to conduct specific program audits during the same period in which a single organization wide audit is being performed, but the audit report has not been issued. The federal or state auditors shall review and have access to the current audit work being conducted and will not apply any testing or review procedures which have not been satisfied by previous audit work that has been completed.

The term "expanded scope auditing" is applied and defined in the U.S. General Accounting Office (GAO) issued Standards for *Audit of Government Organizations, Programs, Activities and Functions*, better known as the "yellow book".

10. Audit and Record Retention

(Applicable to agreements in excess of \$10,000.)

- a. The Contractor shall maintain books, records, documents, and other evidence, accounting procedures and practices, sufficient to properly reflect all direct and indirect costs of whatever nature claimed to have been incurred in the performance of this Agreement, including any matching costs and expenses. The foregoing constitutes "records" for the purpose of this provision.
- b. The Contractor's facility or office or such part thereof as may be engaged in the performance of this Agreement and his/her records shall be subject at all reasonable times to inspection, audit, and reproduction.

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- c. Contractor agrees that CDPH, the Department of General Services, the Bureau of State Audits, or their designated representatives including the Comptroller General of the United States shall have the right to review and to copy any records and supporting documentation pertaining to the performance of this Agreement. Contractor agrees to allow the auditor(s) access to such records during normal business hours and to allow interviews of any employees who might reasonably have information related to such records. Further, the Contractor agrees to include a similar right of the State to audit records and interview staff in any subcontract related to performance of this Agreement. (GC 8546.7, CCR Title 2, Section 1896).
- d. The Contractor shall preserve and make available his/her records (1) for a period of three years from the date of final payment under this Agreement, and (2) for such longer period, if any, as is required by applicable statute, by any other provision of this Agreement, or by subparagraphs (1) or (2) below.
 - (1) If this Agreement is completely or partially terminated, the records relating to the work terminated shall be preserved and made available for a period of three years from the date of any resulting final settlement.
 - (2) If any litigation, claim, negotiation, audit, or other action involving the records has been started before the expiration of the three-year period, the records shall be retained until completion of the action and resolution of all issues which arise from it, or until the end of the regular three-year period, whichever is later.
- e. The Contractor shall comply with the above requirements and be aware of the penalties for violations of fraud and for obstruction of investigation as set forth in Public Contract Code § 10115.10, if applicable.
- f. The Contractor may, at its discretion, following receipt of final payment under this Agreement, reduce its accounts, books and records related to this Agreement to microfilm, computer disk, CD ROM, or other data storage medium. Upon request by an authorized representative to inspect, audit or obtain copies of said records, the Contractor and/or Subcontractor must supply or make available applicable devices, hardware, and/or software necessary to view, copy and/or print said records. Applicable devices may include, but are not limited to, microfilm readers and microfilm printers, etc.
- g. The Contractor shall, if applicable, comply with the Single Audit Act and the audit reporting requirements set forth in Title 2 of the Code of Federal Regulations, Part 200 (2CFR Part 200).

11. Federal Requirements

Grantor agrees to comply with and shall require all subgranteers, if any, to comply with all applicable Federal requirements including but not limited to the United States Code, the Code of Federal Regulations, the Funding Opportunity Announcement, the Notice of Award, the funding agreement, and any memoranda or letter regarding the applicable Federal requirements.
