**Subject:** Annual Certification of County Maintained Road System Mileage (Project No. R3001, F-331 [3C])

**RECOMMENDATION:**

Adopt a resolution certifying the mileage in the County of San Mateo's maintained road system to be 316.228 miles as of December 31, 2016. (Project No. R3001, F-331 [3C])

**BACKGROUND:**

Section 2121 of the California Streets and Highways Code requires that in May of each year, each county shall report to the California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) "any additions or exclusions from its mileage of maintained county highways." This report typically takes the form of a certification of the total mileage of the County of San Mateo's (County's) maintained road system. The total County maintained road system mileage reported to Caltrans in May 2016 was 316.100. Your Board has adopted similar resolutions directing the reporting of the total number of maintained miles in previous years.

**DISCUSSION:**

This year, the proposed total County maintained mileage to be reported to Caltrans is 316.228 miles. There was an addition of 0.128 miles due to updated road measurements taken in 2016.

Exhibit "A" to the resolution provides the summary of the County of San Mateo Maintained Road Mileage, as of December 31, 2016.

County Counsel has reviewed and approved the resolution as to form.

Certification of the mileage in the County's maintained road system contributes to the Shared Vision 2025 outcome of a Collaborative Community by assisting the State of California in their calculation for the allocation of gas tax revenues to the local agencies.

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**FISCAL IMPACT:**

The County of San Mateo is expecting \$12.8 Million in gas tax revenue for the 2016-17 Fiscal Year. Counties are allocated gas tax revenue based on several factors, including road mileage, population, and number of registered vehicles. The Department of Public Works uses these funds to maintain the County of San Mateo's road system for the benefit of the traveling public. The normal cost for managing the road records annually is approximately \$10,000, which is paid for from this gas tax revenue.

There is no impact to the General Fund.
