Subject: Reappointments to the Resource Conservation District Board of Directors

RECOMMENDATION:

Recommendation for reappointments to the Resource Conservation District Board of Directors:

- A) TJ Glauthier, for a term ending December 31, 2020; and
- B) Jim Reynolds, for a term ending December 31, 2020; and
- C) Neal Kramer, for a term ending December 31, 2018.

BACKGROUND:

The Resource Conservation District (RCD) is a non-regulatory special district that helps people protect, conserve, and restore natural resources through information, education, and technical assistance programs. The district provides comprehensive, integrated services addressing wildlife, water, climate, and agriculture.

Serving as a focal point for local conservation efforts, the district collaborates with private and public land owners, land managers, local jurisdictions, public agencies, interest groups, and others.

RCDs are established under California law (Division 9 of the Public Resources Code) to be locally governed with independent boards of directors that are accountable to our communities.

DISCUSSION:

TJ Glauthier and Jim Reynolds have served on the San Mateo Resource Conservation District's Board of Directors since April 2009 and wish to be reappointed. TJ Glauthier is a resident and landowner in Seal Cove. Jim Reynolds is a resident and landowner in Pescadero. Neal Kramer has served since February 2009 and wishes to be reappointed. Neal Kramer is a resident and landowner in Montara.

These reappointments contribute to the 2025 Shared Vision statement of a Collaborative Community. Our diverse population works well together to build strong communities, effective government and a prosperous economy, civic engagement – including voting, public service, charitable giving, volunteerism, and participation in public discussions of important issues – is uniformly high among the diverse population of San Mateo County.
