## Subject: Amendment to the agreement with One East Palo Alto

## **RECOMMENDATION:**

Adopt a Resolution waiving the Request for Proposals process and authorizing an amendment to the agreement with One East Palo Alto for the provision of alcohol and other drug prevention services, increasing the amount by \$75,000 to \$225,000, and extending the term through December 31, 2013.

# BACKGROUND:

On June 19, 2012, your Board approved an agreement with One East Palo Alto to provide alcohol and other drug prevention services, for the term July 1, 2012 through June 30, 2013. The East Palo Alto work plan is based on a community needs assessment and reflects the community's priorities. Contractor will continue to be the lead agency in a collaborative effort, by promoting and improving connections between individuals, peers, families, and other stakeholders. Contractor will also continue to reduce access to and availability of alcohol and other drugs to youth, and build on community assets in order to deliver a full range of prevention based activities.

# DISCUSSION:

In response to the Affordable Care Act of 2010, Behavioral Health and Recovery Services (BHRS) is analyzing how services can best be delivered in the County. In 2011, the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Administration published a paper defining what a good and modern behavioral health system of care would look like in this transformed healthcare environment.

The vision for a good and modern mental health and addiction system focuses on integrating primary care and behavioral health care, system and service coordination, health promotion, prevention, screening and early intervention, treatment, resilience and recovery support, promoting social integration, employment, housing and educational

services, and supporting optimal health and productivity. A full range of high quality services is necessary to meet the range of age, gender, cultural and other needs of County residents, and to promote healthy behavior and lifestyles, a primary driver of health outcomes. Currently, BHRS is in the development phase of how to implement this vision. BHRS is actively working to clarify the roles and responsibilities associated with the change in structure, financing and operation of the redesign.

Therefore, BHRS believes that it is in the best interest of the County to continue collaborating with existing providers in the delivery of Alcohol and Other Drug (AOD) prevention and treatment services in San Mateo County while working out the details of the redesign. BHRS recommends a waiver of the Request for Proposal (RFP) process for all AOD Prevention and Treatment services providing alcohol and other drug prevention, treatment and recovery services for an additional six months, by extending the term of the agreement through December 31, 2013, and increasing the contract maximum by \$75,000. BHRS is in the process of preparing an RFP for AOD prevention services beginning January 1, 2014. There are 16 AOD Prevention and/or Treatment contracts that will be amended and submitted separately for your Board's consideration.

The Amendment and Resolution have been reviewed and approved by County Counsel as to form.

The contractor has assured compliance with the County's Contractor Employee Jury Service Ordinance, as well as all other contract provisions that are required by County ordinance and administrative memoranda, including but not limited to insurance, hold harmless, non-discrimination and equal benefits.

The amendment contributes to the Shared Vision 2025 outcome of a Healthy Community by providing individuals and families in San Mateo County with prevention and treatment services to support recovery, which in turn contributes to the health and safety of communities throughout San Mateo County. It is anticipated that 75% of participants receiving services will agree or strongly agree that the prevention partnership is effective in the reduction of alcohol and other drugs.

## FISCAL IMPACT:

The term of the amended agreement is July 1, 2012 through December 31, 2013. The agreement maximum is being increased by \$75,000 to a new maximum of \$225,000. Of that amount, it is anticipated that 100% will be funded by State Net Negotiated

allocation. This amount has been included in the FY 2012-13 Adopted Budget and \$75,000 will be included in the FY 2013-14 Recommended Budget. There is no Net County Cost. The payment provisions of the agreement are different from the original agreement because the extension will allow contractor to serve additional clients and provide more units of service.
