



FY 2013-14 Accomplishments

 Invested over \$8.3M to Local Programs to support:



- 9,997 children prenatal to age five
- 12,264 parents/guardians and expectant parents
- 4,719 service providers who work with children prenatal to age five and their families
- 4,236 Kits for New Parents



FY 2013-14 Accomplishments

Child Health & Development

- F5SMC-funded programs screened **1,433** children for developmental delays or other disabilities.
- 251 children with identified special needs, parents received case management and care coordination to ensure access to services to address those needs.

Family Support & Engagement

 1,935 children and 3,262 parents received home visiting/care coordination services for serious challenges, such as poverty, mental health issues, substance use, and domestic violence.

Early Learning

 1,916 children and 2,823 parents or other family members participated in family literacy activities to boost early math and reading skills.


