- Subject: Agreement with Legal Aid Society of San Mateo County to provide legal assistance, family caregiver support, client's rights advocacy and kids in crisis services

RECOMMENDATION:

Adopt a resolution authorizing an agreement with Legal Aid Society of San Mateo County to provide legal assistance, family caregiver support, client's rights advocacy and kids in crisis services for the term of July 1, 2015 through June 30, 2016, in an amount not to exceed \$154,320.

BACKGROUND:

On April 14, 2015, your Board, as the Area Agency on Aging (AAA), approved the AAA FY 2015-16 Update to the Area Plan for Older Adults and Adults with Disabilities (Plan). This Plan provides a profile of the County's senior population, identifies activities to improve and expand existing services, as well as to develop new programs designed to address the current countywide needs, and recommends services to be funded with San Mateo County's Older Americans Act (OAA) funding allocations.

In November 2012, Aging and Adult Services (AAS) issued a Request for Proposals (RFP) to provide services to older adults and adults with disabilities for the term July 1, 2013, through June 30, 2015. Legal Aid Society of San Mateo County (Legal Aid) was selected by the RFP Evaluation Committee and ultimately provided legal assistance, family caregiver support, client's rights advocacy and kids in crisis services for the aforementioned term.

DISCUSSION:

Under the proposed agreement, Legal Aid will provide legal assistance and family caregiver support program services to individuals 60 years and older. To individuals between the ages of 18 and 59, Legal Aid will provide clients' rights advocacy and kids in crisis program services. Legal Aid's services will target those in economic and social need, i.e. low-income minority individuals and older individuals with limited English proficiency.

This contract is late because of delays in receiving and processing the OAA funding through the California Department of Aging.

AAS is requesting to waive the RFP process at this time in order to allow for uninterrupted services while AAS completes a community needs assessment and develops an area plan that will inform program needs and allow a more comprehensive RFP for the OAA programs.

AAS requests your Board to authorize the Chief of the Health System or designee to execute contract amendments which modify the County's maximum fiscal obligation by no more than \$25,000 (in aggregate), and/or modify the contract term and/or services so long as the modified term or services is/are within the current or revised fiscal provisions.

The agreement and resolution have been reviewed and approved by County Counsel as to form. This agreement is on the Continuing Resolution.

This agreement contributes to the Shared Vision 2025 outcome of a Healthy Community by providing home and community based services (e.g. legal services) to individuals aged 60 and above. It is anticipated that approximately 660 individuals (60 and above) will receive legal services through the Area Agency on Aging.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The term of the agreement is July 1, 2015 through June 30, 2016, for an amount not to exceed \$154,320. Of this amount, \$81,930 is funded by OAA. The remaining \$72,390 is net county cost. Payment provisions for these services are essentially the same as the prior contract. Funds for these services are included in the AAS FY 2015-16 Recommended Budget.
