

THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS COUNTY OF SAN MATEO, STATE OF CALIFORNIA PROCLAMATION HONORING AND COMMENDING

World Alzheimer's Month

**WHEREAS**, **Alzheimer's** is the most common cause of dementia, a general term for memory loss and other cognitive abilities serious enough to interfere with daily life. Alzheimer's disease accounts for 60-80% of dementia cases; and

**WHEREAS**, Alzheimer's worsens over time. Alzheimer's is a progressive disease, where dementia symptoms gradually worsen over a number of years; and

**WHEREAS**, Alzheimer's greatest known risk factor is increasing age, and the majority of people with Alzheimer's are 65 and older. But Alzheimer's is not just a disease of old age. Approximately 200,000 Americans under the age of 65 have younger-onset Alzheimer's disease; and

**WHEREAS**, Alzheimer's is the sixth leading cause of death in the United States. On average, a person with Alzheimer's lives four to eight years after diagnosis, but can live as long as 20 years, depending on other factors; and

**WHEREAS**, Alzheimer's has no current cure, but treatments for symptoms are available and research continues; and

**WHEREAS**, Alzheimer's current treatments cannot stop Alzheimer's from progressing, they can temporarily slow the worsening of dementia symptoms and improve quality of life for those with Alzheimer's and their caregivers; and

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT PROCLAIMED** that the Board of Supervisors of the County of San Mateo, State of California, hereby designates September 1-30, 2020 as World Alzheimer's Month and encourages everyone to realize the importance of understanding Alzheimer's in our communities.
