Introduction to 2021 Redistricting

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Timing

Month(s)	Event
February / March	Project planning.
May (hopefully)	2020 Census data released.
June / July	Time for public to draw draft maps.
August / September	Discuss and revise draft maps.
October	Narrow and revise map options.
November 15	Last day for 2 nd reading of ordinance

Timeline could shift depending on Census data availability, which may be as late as August.



Timing Requirements

- □ At least four hearings
 - One prior to drawing any official draft maps
 - At least two after release of draft maps
 - Initial "hearing" can be a formal hearing, study session or informal public forum
 - At least one hearing in the evening or on a weekend
 - "the public hearing shall begin at a fixed time regardless of its order on the agenda"
- □ Post the final map online at least 7 days prior to adoption
- □ Adopt as a regular ordinance





Census Data

- □ By Statute, Census data should be released by April 1
 - But it will be late

- California requires Census data to be adjusted to relocate prison populations
 - Projected to take up to two weeks

1. Federal Laws

- Federal Voting Rights Act
- No Racial Gerrymandering

2. California Criteria

- 1. Geographically contiguous
- 2. Undivided neighborhoods and "communities of interest"
- 3. Undivided Cities, Towns and Census Designated Places
- 4. Easily identifiable boundaries
- Compact(Do not bypass one group of people to get to a more distant group of people)
- 6. Shall not favor or

3. Other Traditional Redistricting Principles


- Respect voters' choices / avoid head to head contests
- □ Future population growth
- Minimize election year changes





"Community of Interest" Defined

- □ Elections Code Section 21500(c)(2):
 - To the extent practicable, the geographic integrity of any local neighborhood or local community of interest shall be respected in a manner that minimizes its division.
 - A "community of interest" is a population that shares common social or economic interests that should be included within a single district for purposes of its effective and fair representation.
- □ Boards should now formally identify "Section 21500 Communities of Interest" early in the process.
 - Cities, Towns and Census Designated Places are not "communities of interest"



Mapping Options

- □ Historically, most redistricting is run by the elected body
 - A few included advisory commissions
 - Independent commissions had to be written into a charter
- □ For 2011, two new state laws allow counties new options without needing a charter amendment:
 - 1. Keep the typical Board-managed process
 - 2. An advisory commission
 - 3. An independent commission
 - 4. A "hybrid" commission



Commission Options

- □ Elections Code Section 23000 Authorization
 - Advisory:
 - Appointed by Board
 - No elected officials, family members or paid campaign staff
 - No extra mapping criteria
 - Hybrid or Independent:
 - Board sets appointment process, but may not directly appoint
 - Extensive restrictions on commission member qualifications
 - "shall not draw districts for the purpose of favoring or discriminating against a political party or an incumbent or political candidate."





Commission Results

- □ Advisory:
 - Develops a map or maps that the Board adopts or revises
- □ Hybrid:
 - Develops two maps and the Board must adopt one or the other
- □ Independent:
 - Adopts a map with no Board review

Outreach Requirements

- □ "Good faith effort" to:
 - Notify all media organizations
 - Notify "good government, civil rights, civic engagement, or community groups or organizations that are active in the city"
 - Live translation if requested 72* hours in advance
 - Distribute hearing notices at least five* days in advance
 - Within two weeks, release either a recording or a written summary of each public comment and council deliberation made at every public hearing or workshop
 - Provide everything in all "applicable languages"
- □ Secretary of State provided template materials and the list of "applicable languages" for each city


